## Georgetown Transportation To Discontinue Eaton's Run

Georgetown Transportation Company has announced that it will soon discontinue its urban bus service for Bramalea. The Georgetown firm instituted a bus service in November linking Bramalea to Malton and Brampton with assistance from Eaton's Bramalea following months of negotiations.

People wishing to use the bus could flag it down at the roadside anywhere along the route. The vehicles provided a half hour service to the city centre in Bramalea.

John Scott, spokesman for Georgetown Transportation, said

the service has been "unsuccessful."

"We will discontinue it shortly," he stated.

Manager of the Eaton's store, Don Evans, said "In terms of the number of passengers on the available service it was much less than was expected by both Georgetown and ourselves."

With the present conditions and schedules it is impractical to continue the service.

"I have not sat down with officials from Georgetown to discuss where we go from here, but I hope to very soon," said the store manager.

On the question of the possible urban service he said there has been some discussion with Bramalea Consolidated Developments, developers of the plaza.

"We have indicated that we are prepared to participate if the terms of service are correct," said Mr. Evans.

The question of the number of buses, the hours, the schedule and other aspects still have to be resolved, he said.

"We are far from resolving this," said Mr. Evans.

### Notice of 1972 Interim Tax Levy

Tax notices are now being prepared for part payment of 1972 Business and Property taxes based on approximately 50 percent of the 1971 tax rate. This is being done to conserve Bank charges on certain payments to Boards and Commissions which must be met prior to June 1, 1972.

These Taxes become due and payable on the following dates:

FIRST INSTALLMENT DUE ON FEBRUARY 1st, 1972  
SECOND INSTALLMENT DUE ON APRIL 3rd, 1972

Upon default of payment of the Interim Tax Demand a penalty of one (1) percent per month or fraction thereof will be charged on the first day of default and on the first day of each calendar month thereafter until Taxes are fully paid. Interest at the rate of One (1) percent per month will be added to all Tax Arrears (one or more years or fraction of years unpaid) beginning January 1st 1972 and will continue in effect until total Taxes are paid.

Please contact the Tax Office in the event you are not in receipt of the 1972 Interim Tax Notice by January 17th, 1972. Failure to receive a tax notice does not in any way exempt you from paying Taxes and appertinent charges.

Should you inadvertently receive a Tax Notice which should have been sent to the Mortgage Company please forward same to your mortgage or Loan Company as soon as possible.
