

# Richardson's Overtime Goal Raiders Sunday Tie at Dunn

Doug "Smockey" Richardson's second goal of the game enabled Georgetown's North Halton Raiders to gain a 3-all tie with Dunnville Mudcats in Dunnville Sunday and stayed tied with that same team in third place in the OHA Intermediate A Niagara Peninsula League.

Raiders drew even in the standings with the Mudcats by beating them 7-3 here Friday night. But Dunnville has three games in hand on their Georgetown rivals having played just 21 games to Raiders' 24.

Since they started putting victories back to back in December, Raiders have rocked from sixth place in the seven team circuit to the position they now share with Dunnville.

First place Welland will be in the Memorial Arena Friday night to see if the fast-rising Georgetown club is for real.

**DOWN THREE**

Raiders were looking at a 3-0 deficit after just five and a half minutes of Sunday's first period. They manufactured one goal before the period ended and outscored Dunnville 1-0 in each of the remaining periods to bring about the overtime.

Dunnville's Larry Pitts was the local hero momentarily as he gave his club a 4-3 lead at 4:37 of the extra session. But Richardson's goal four minutes later

from Blake Ingils and Al Rachon gave Georgetown the point.

Richardson's goal was actually worth two points since it saved Raiders from falling that much back behind Dunnville in the rankings.

Terry Cook notched Georgetown's first goal from Bill Currie and Steve Blundy with a minute and a half left in the first period. Richardson scored his first of the game from Paul Robinson and Rachon in the middle of the second period, and Robinson improved his position in the personal points race with Raiders' third goal, Cook and Neil Cotton assisting.

**SHOTS REVERSED**

Georgetown sniped at Dunnville's Robbie Stewart 35 times, while Keith Pallett blocked 46 Mudcat shots. All the 13 penalties were minors. Georgetown drew seven of them.

Friday in Georgetown Memorial Arena, the shots were reversed with Pallett tested 35 times to Tom Bowker's 42.

Raiders had command throughout this one, grabbing a 1-0 first period lead and expanding it to 4-1 by the end of the second period. At one point in the third they had the visitors down 6-2.

Five hundred fans watched Blake Ingils pot the initial tally from Robinson and Cotton at 4:22. Doug Richardson from Ingils and

Robinson, Tom Hicks from Tibbitts and Holmes rocked Dunnville with goals in the first minute and a half of the second period, and then Robinson from Blake Ingils made it 4-0.

**LATE START**

Dunnville didn't count until less than five minutes remained in the middle period. Larry Pitts got that one from brother Ted. Georgetown's three third period scoring went like this: Ron Lane from Cook and Blundy at 5:41; Cook from Robinson and Currie at 9:33; and Cotton from Richardson and Hicks at 14:34.

Dunnville's pair came from Barnett and Schewyer at 13:52 and 19:09 respectively.

The penalty parade again saw Georgetown take seven of 13 minors.

Against lowly Port Colborne on that club's home ice last Tuesday, Georgetown outshot the opposition 50 to 29 and each team scored once for every 10 shots. The edge was 19-5 in the first period, and 25-9 in the second. Strangely, the shots were even, six apiece, in the third.

**PENALTIES**

Robinson, Cook, Ingils, Blundy and Blair scored for Raiders, Bob Waines and Mike Green for the losers.

Penalties had something to do with the lopsided shots totals. Raider players served four minors, but Port Colborne got nicked for 10 minor calls and a 10 minute misconduct to their high scoring forward Bill McGowan.

McGowan has the lead in the points race with 41, one more than Welland's Duane Rutley. Raiders' Paul Robinson, who missed some tilts at the start of the campaign has slipped into third. He has 22 goals and 17 assists for 39 points.

tom can see it up there and a laker 15 or 20 feet above can see it down below.

One good thing to keep in mind is the fact that the lakers will be at the same depth as the trout herring which they feed on.

Trout herring are approximately five or six inches long and 40 of them were counted in the stomachs of three lake trout that we caught one day in Lake Simcoe.

They had all been swallowed head first. Despite the fact that they had full stomachs, our decoys looked to good to resist.

There are lakes other than Lake Simcoe with big lake trout. Two of them are Bark Lake and Timagami.

**IN FOR TREAT**

The days are getting longer now and the sun is gradually sending down more heat, so if you have a snowmobile, you are in for a treat, out on the lake fishing for lakers.

This is all for this week, so tight lines, enjoy the outdoors & safe journey.

effective it should be jigged at different depths. Many good lakers are caught 20 feet down and can be seen plainly especially if the fish hat is kept dark.

Sliver wobblers are also very effective. If one prefers large ones. A hole should be drilled in each side and a split ring and treble hook attached. A strong elastic hand placed over the wobbler to hold the hooks in place to prevent a tangle is a good idea. The line should be at least 20 lb. test and swivels should be attached at intervals on the line to prevent twisting when jigging. A 12 inch stick one and a half inches wide and 12 inches long, notched on each end to wind the line on is also a good idea.

If the angler counts the rounds off the stick as he lowers his decoy or wobbler he is always aware of its depth and how far it is to bottom.

**EFFECTIVE DEPTH**

A very effective depth to fish is 15 or 20 feet off the bottom. A laker swimming along the bot-
