Defense Contract For Varian

A \$27,600 government contract for electronic supplies has been awarded to Varian Associates of Canada Ltd., at 45 River Drive, in Georgetown by the Defense Supply Agency's Defense Electronics Supply Center in Dayton, Ohio.

The contract calls for 80 electron tubes. Contracts awarded Canadian companies are let through the Canadian Commercial Corporation at Ottawa. This is a fixed-price supply type contract awarded after competitive negotiations. The Defense Electronics Supply Center procures, manages and supplies common electronic parts used by the armed services and various other government agencies.

To Serve Community Needs

Form Advisory Committee for Halton's New Provincial Park

Prime Minister William Davis has announced the formation of the Bronte Creek Provincial Park Advisory Committee to aid the government in establishing policies for development and operation of a new 1,500-acre park in South Halton.

Donald M. Blenkhorne of Oakville, an architect with considerable experience in municipal planning and former chairman of the Oakville-Trafalgar-Bronte Joint Planning Board for Bronte Creek Provincial Park, is committee chairman.

Other members, all residents of the area, to ensure that local community and regional needs are met, include:

Councillor P. J. Hughes of Oakville; D. H. Rigg, commissioner of parks and recreation for Oakville; E. R. Cumming, Oakville planning director; Mayor George W. Harrington of Burlington; Laurie Branch, director of recreation services for Burlington; Richard Moskal, director of long range planning for Burlington; Brock Harris, chairman of the Land Use Ad-

visory Board, Halton Region Conservation Authority; Douglas Davidson of Burlington; R. E. Goodin of Oakville; P. J. Kelly, president of the Oakville Optimist Club; George S. Atkins of Oakville; Robert Laing, president of the White Oaks Wanderers, Oakville, and John D. Orr of Oakville.

IN IMMEDIATE REACH
While the park will readily accommodate travellers seeking campsites while visiting the attractions of the Toronto-Hamilton region, it is expected the great majority of people using Bronte Creek Provincial Park will come from within the immediate 25-mile radius — including such communities as Georgetown, Burlington, Milton, Oakville, Mississauga, Port Credit and a large western portion of Metropolitan Toronto.

Open the year round, Bronte Creek Park will be developed to serve community needs in such areas as education, recreation, nature study and the preservation of open spaces. Mr. Davis said the varied topography of the area will lend itself ideally to the wide variety of activities planned for the park. These include hiking, cycling, viewing of natural surroundings, outdoor

education, family and group picnicking, swimming, tennis and team sports such as baseball, football, soccer, and others.

A golf course bordering on the property will remain untouched by the park development. In establishing the park, the Department of Lands and Forests will work closely with Halton Region Conservation Authority to make sure that all the valuable features of the property are preserved or enhanced and that no new installations will give rise to pollution in any form, Mr. Davis said.
