Had Thirty Calls From Unhappy Supply Teachers

Tom Ramautarsingh, president of Halton unit of the O. S. S. T. F. told The Herald he had received 30 calls from supply teachers about the Halton County Board of Education's plan to cut their salary 25 percent.

He said he was very happy the Board had changed their minds, and pointed out that the O. S. S. T. F. could not argue for the supply teachers since they are not members of the Federation. "I did, however, pass on the calls I received to O. Gilmore, Superintendent of Instruction," said Ramautarsingh.

He also said he had some response to his controversial questionnaire, which he sent out a few weeks ago. "Many parents came to see me, and the teachers are now discussing it," he commented.

He explained this had been the purpose of the questionnaire, to start discussion about the many points he raised.

Flood Line Prevents Building

Bill Edie, lot 16 Con. 8, Stewarttown is being prevented from building on his land, because it has been designated flood land.

Edie told Esquering council he had letters from long time residents, such as George Currie, Aubrey Grant, Dave Barclay, stating there had never been flooding in Stewarttown, during Hurricane Hazel or any other time. He said the Credit Valley Conservation Authority based their flood lines on land flooded during Hurricane Hazel.

The Halton County Health Unit has already approved the land in the one and half acre parcel for a septic tank.

Council passed a resolution asking the Credit Valley Conservation Authority to exempt the land from flood land designation.

Family of Three Homeless After Farm Cottage Burns

A cottage on the farm of Murray Laird, occupied by Mr. & Mrs. Jeannot Chiasson and their little 19 month old son Danny, was gutted by fire about 10:30 p.m. Saturday. An overheated oil space heater in the basement was the cause.

Mr. & Mrs. Chiasson were out for the evening celebrating Mr. Chiasson's birthday and Mrs. Chiasson's sister Lea Savole of Georgetown and her friend Victor Mallet were baby sitting when the fire broke out. They ran with the baby to the home of Mr. & Mrs. Laird for help.

The Lairds and Mr. & Mrs. Grohe who live in an apartment in the Laird home, formed a bucket brigade until the arrival of the Chinguacousy Fire Department who fought the blaze in the bitter 10 below zero weather.

Mr. & Mrs. Chiasson lost almost all of their possessions which were only about two years old. All their furniture including a refrigerator and stove, their bedding and clothing. They had just purchased the week's supply of groceries that day.

The only clothes they have are the ones they were wearing at the time of the fire.

The Chiassons are staying with the Savole family in Georgetown until other arrangements can be made. The Georgetown Red Cross gave some immediate assistance but the family is in need of help from the community, as their loss was not covered by insurance.

At the time of the fire another couple who were out of work, Mr.

& Mrs. Bernard Lantaigne, were staying with the Chiassons. They were also out for the evening and they lost all their clothing in the fire.
