Council Says No Again

A second request from William Hunter for further consideration to allowing a hydro line to be erected over the old Forge property in Terra Cotta to serve his property, was turned down by the general Committee of Peel County council Thursday.

Mr. Hunter's first request in November was denied.

"I know it is tough on Mr. Hunter, but that property has been leased to Chinguacousy Township", said Chinguacousy Reeve Robert Williams.

"The area around Terra Cotta is under study now with the aim to preserve it as a scenic area and we can't accede to his request", Reeve Williams said.

Morrow Will Chair Halton Manor Committee

At the inaugural meeting of Halton County council last week members were named to the new committees, introduced on an experimental basis last year.

Elected chairman of the Roads Committee was deputy reeve Don McMillan, Nassagaweya, with members R. Harris, Milton; T. Hill, Esquesing; A. Speight, Georgetown; F. G. Oakes, Acton; A. Masson, Oakville, and Warden Swanborough.

The Administration Committee has A. Masson, Oakville, chairman and members Ric Morrow, D. A. Coons, A. MacArthur, G. McKenzie, R. Miller, R. Harris, and Warden Swanborough.

Representatives to the Museum Board are A. Speight, and R. Harris.

Must Be Independent of Peel

New Warden Favours Halton Region

Halton county should remain intact and should set up its own regional government unit, warden James Swanborough said last week as he took office.

Swanborough, the reeve of Burlington, was the only candidate for the warden's office. Earlier he had won majority support for the post in a closed meeting of county councillors.

Immediately after being named warden, Swanborough, a partner in a Hamilton-based law firm, issued an inaugural statement in which he opposed any move to permit a Hamilton takeover of the Burlington area in Halton county.

The takeover was proposed in a regional government study issued in November, 1969 by the Steele Commission. Provincial

authorities still have not made a decision on the report, although including Burlington in a Metro Hamilton region has met with stiff opposition.

One of those opposed to Burlington being lumped in with Metro Hamilton is Swanborough who, as reeve of the lakefront town, has said the takeover would be the downfall of Halton.

The Steele Commission headed by lawyer Donald R. Steele, studied regional government in the Hamilton-Wentworth County-Burlington area. The Commission said a Metro Hamilton unit should be set up, with Burlington being cut out of Halton and included in the Hamilton-centred region.

The proposal by Steele to remove Burlington from Halton met immediate opposition, and a month after the regional report was issued the citizens of Burlington voted down a Hamilton takeover by a 75 percent margin.

NO DECISION
Queen's Park officials have still not made a final decision on whether Burlington will be put into the Metro Hamilton area, or whether it will remain in a Halton-Peel regional unit. The City of Hamilton would have the majority voting power on the Metro council in the Hamilton region.

Among those opposing the takeover of Burlington were the town of Oakville and Halton County.

Swanborough said last week that Halton county must now proceed with a regional government unit of its own, which includes Burlington. He said this unit would be set up independent of neighboring Peel county.

BACKED OFF
Two regional government plans that have been proposed since 1965 have proposed that Halton and Peel be brought together in a single regional unit.

However, no progress has been made toward the Halton-Peel concept because of opposition from various rural areas within the two counties. The last Halton-Peel plan was proposed by former municipal affairs minister Darcy McKeough who suggested a Halton-Peel Metro, operating with a regional council a series of

borough units. The plan was called "McKeough's Metro" and was patterned after the Metro Toronto civic government concept.

McKeough backed off his plan in the face of stiff opposition from some areas of Peel county. Halton county had accepted McKeough's Metro.

PERMISSION
Swanborough said last week the province should give Halton permission to go ahead with a regional plan of its own that includes Burlington.

He said the Halton regional unit would be similar to that in York County. The plan would involve all seven communities in Halton, with the county council acting as the regional administrative unit.

"We need this decision to make sound decisions on matters necessary to continue the services which we provide to all the people of the county", the warden said.

Swanborough also said Halton would continue to press the provincial government for increased subsidies for the Halton County Board of Health. He said the board meets all the criteria of a regional board and should receive the 75 percent subsidy instead of the present 50 percent.

DRILLED HOME
The Ontario government will also be asked to raise subsidies for road construction to allow the county to keep up with the expanding county road system and growing traffic loads caused by population growth.

Swanborough's address was laced with references to existing and forthcoming county-wide organizations and co-operative programs affecting all seven municipalities as he drilled home the idea that Halton County has a regional type of government in all but name.

Jetport May Still Be Located in Area

A major airport in this part of Halton County became a strong possibility again Friday when the

federal transport department (DOT) publicly eliminated Orangeville as a site because of its heavy fogs and snowfalls.

DOT officials have never expressed opinions on the department's preference of a site for the new Toronto jetport but appear more enthusiastic now about locating it within a Georgetown-Milton-Guelph triangle.

The possible North Halton location was immediately opposed 18 months ago when the federal government told the province of four possible locations for the jetport. In addition to North Halton and Orangeville, Ottawa suggested Barrie to the north and Port Perry to the east as areas for locating the airport.

OPPOSED
The municipal councils of Georgetown, Esquesing, Nassagaweya and Burlington have all opposed the plan.

The only municipal support for

negotiations on the airport broke down before Christmas over the formula for financing roads and services at the new airport.

Federal officials say the issue is not settled but general agreement has been reached on cost sharing.

Speculation
Orangeville was the preferred site until Friday's announcement. Officials are refusing to express a preference among the remaining three sites to discourage land speculation and rising prices.
