**For Five Year Period**

**\$20 Million Budget Approved By Halton Education Board**

The Halton board of education last week approved a capital budget of \$20,915,000 for the five-year period 1972-76. The budget is \$1,690,000 greater than the five-year capital budget forecast for 1971-75.

The increase in the budget is mostly at the secondary school level where enough funds have been allowed to permit the construction of two new secondary schools by 1976. The previous five-year forecast allowed for only one additional secondary school.

The Halton board expects "an expansion of the secondary school system at the rate of about 1,000 pupils per year."

No growth in the total public school population is expected in the next five years. "This is due to a decrease in the kindergarten enrolment reflecting the declining birth rate of the past few years," says the preamble of the board's capital budget report.

"There are several areas in the southern part of the county that are experiencing rapid developments," the report continues, "and schools will have to be provided for these areas. To accommodate this the capital budget provides for about 500 pupil places (more) per year."

The five-year capital budget forecast provides for three senior elementary school facilities in the Oakville (east) education area, plus the "upgrading of facilities in all areas."
