## Georgetown Firm Building Natural Science School

Zorge Construction Company Limited of Georgetown, began construction this week on the Boyne River Natural Science School for the Toronto Board of Education. This school located in Mulmur Township, just north of Primrose, in the Shelburne area, is a unique project.

The 218 acres on which the school will be built was purchased by the Toronto Board in 1965. When completed, it will be the largest outdoor natural science school in North America. It is expected to draw much attention from many large urban school boards throughout the continent, and will serve as a model for other Metro Toronto School Boards who have recently purchased land for similar projects.

**DORMITORIES**  
The school will operate on a year round pupil rotation basis. It is complete in every detail including separate student dormitories, dining and recreational facilities.

Each week, 144 grade 6 students from the Toronto Board System will be bused to the school, and will live in residence during the week studying outdoor science. The site is ideal for the purpose, in that the Boyne River runs throughout the property, along with three tributaries. There are three large man-made ponds on the property along with numerous nature trails.

**UNIQUE NATURE**  
The project, originally awarded to the Zorge firm a year ago was deferred due to changes in Board policy. It was recently revived, prices were adjusted to allow for increased cost components, and a contract signed in the amount of \$1,634,750.00. Officials of Zorge Construction said they are pleased that they will be participating in this project due to its unique nature, and because of the social implications involving the children from the heart of Metro Toronto. Programs of this type accent the pollution problem present in urban centres, when compared to the natural setting of the school.

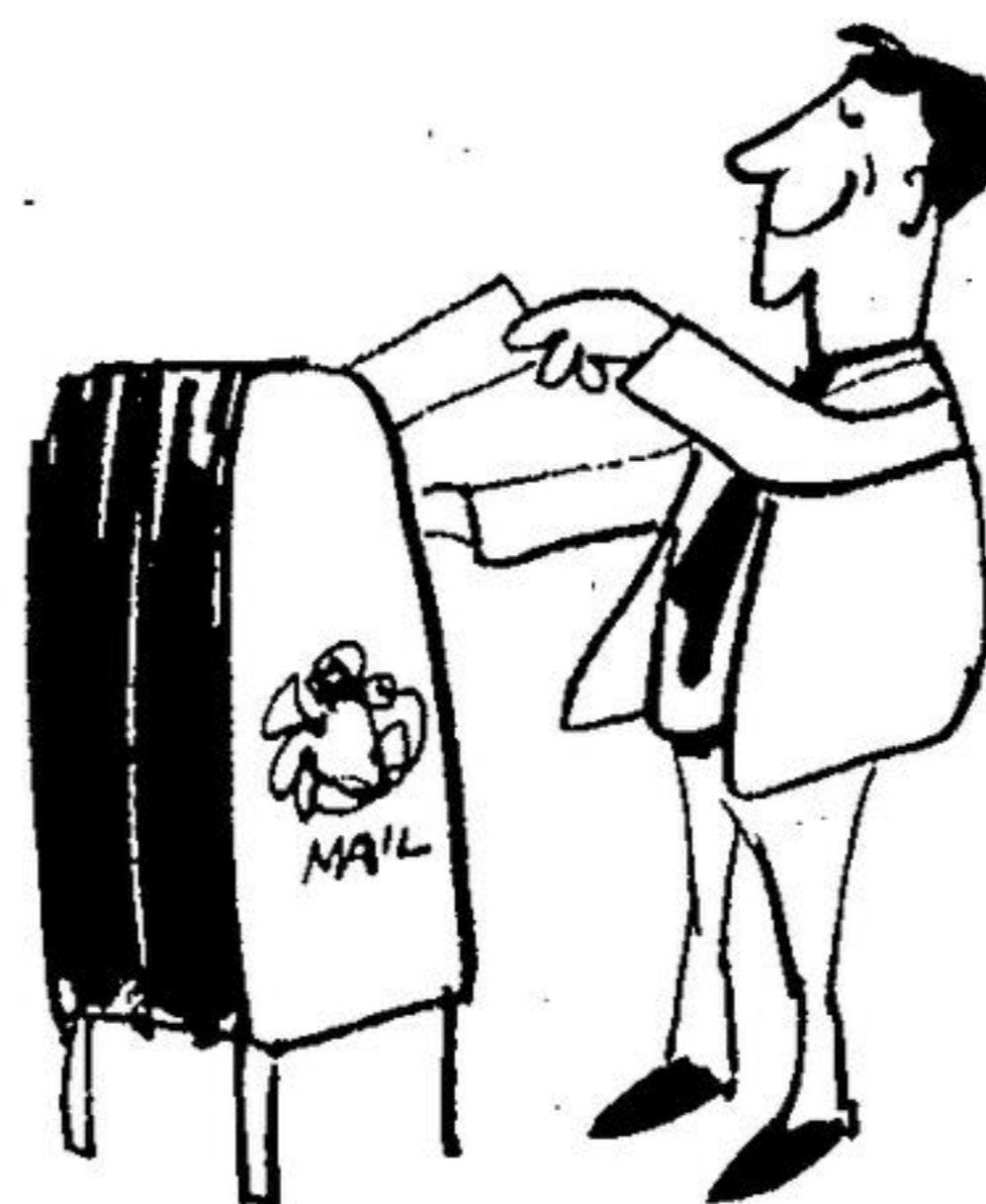
