# World's Deadliest Create? Nothing Challenges Cobra

I have never been to India where the world's largest venomous snake is found, namely the king cobra, but this is the information I have concerning it.

It doesn't strike like most snakes but lunges towards you with great speed.

The record apparently is an 18 foot 4 inch monster. Its colour is olive cross-banded with black. The throat and chin are light orange. Herpetologists consider it the most beautiful and the deadliest snake.

Cobras strike, bite, chew briefly and the victim has had it. The venom has an immediate effect on the nerve centers, producing death by paralysis of the muscles that control the breathing.

The cobra is noted for its personality, size and for the tremendous amount of venom it possesses. Its fangs are just over 1/2 an inch long.

**STRONGER VENOM**  
In India it takes five years to train an elephant, the world's largest land mammal, weighing six tons, and the venom from the cobra can kill the elephant in less than three hours. Usually the cobra strikes the elephant between the toes or on the end of the trunk.

The king cobra's venom is five times stronger than that of the Russell's viper, famed for its deadliness, and responsible for many of the 20,000 deaths by snake bite in India yearly.

A resourceful salesman once stated: "the most unselfish gift a person can give his family is to be covered by adequate life insurance."

Places for a weary populace to recreate body and soul for a week, a day or just a few hours on a Sunday afternoon. A place where one can stroll or ride or even hunt and fish with peace of mind knowing that he is not trespassing on someone else's property; free to roam over large areas for long distances within easy reach of his home.

Some places do exist, scattered uniformly throughout the great megalopolis of Southern Ontario: Provincial Parks, Conservation Areas, Picnic Sites, Crown Lands and Agreement Forest Lands.

Early in the life of this province, men of vision set aside, through legislation, areas like Algonquin Provincial Park. Since then 55 parks have been created in Southern Ontario. Through steady land-purchasing programs Crown Land has been acquired in key locations. Counties and Townships and River Valley Authorities have assembled land where available for agreement forests.

**SHORT-SIGHTED**  
There are 60 agreement forests covering 231,000 acres in Southern Ontario, many in the path of rapidly developing urban areas, to provide the open space neglected by short-sighted planners. By the year 2000 our population will nearly double with 80 per cent living in urban areas. As high as 50 per cent of urban populations live in apartment complexes, ingeniously designed with all
