

Miller Is Deputy

Georgetown Reeve Aged Home Chairman After Musical Chairs

Malton County Warden James Swanborough and Georgetown reeve Rick Morrow popped in and out of their chairs like corks Wednesday as members of the Malton-Centennial Manor Board continually revived the election of Morrow as chairman. Swanborough was attempting to pass the chair to Morrow. Morrow was named chairman of the board by county council's striking committee at the inaugural meeting last week amid confusion over whether the chairman would be named for each committee or subsequently

electd by the committees themselves. The dispute started when Swanborough took the chair and attempted to have the committee of seven select the official committee of five. The provincial Homes for the Aged Act stipulates a five-member management committee. **REDUCED** Reorganization of county council's committee structure reduced it to four seven-member committees. Each of the 14 councillors received two committee appointments.

The warden suggested Milton deputy-reeve Bob McCuaig should be on the committee since he was not on the official Board of Health. McCuaig's other committee. Past warden Frank Oakes, the Acton reeve, suggested the committee should include himself and Oakville deputy-reeve Harry Barrett as the two members who had served on the manor board in 1971. **NO NEED** Faced with no voluntary withdrawals, Swanborough said there

was no need for himself to be on the committee since it would be raised to seven members in the next two to three months by the province. Dr. Oakes did the same. The Esquering deputy reeve Russ Miller nominated Dr. Oakes for the chairman. Swanborough said the chairman would have to be on the official committee. Nassagaweya reeve Anne MacArthur nominated Morrow and Barrett moved nominations be closed. Morrow and Swanborough stood up to change places. **NO SECRET** Miller said he had never talked to anyone about the committee chairmanship and why wasn't a real election being held. Morrow and Swanborough resumed their original seats. Swanborough said he made no secret of the fact that he had made recommendations in the striking committee for both committee appointments and committee chairmanships. "I made suggestions in the form of leadership". Dr. Oakes said: "Don't feel you have to put me on as chairman of any committee just because I am a former warden". Morrow and Swanborough stood up. Miller asked if his nomination of Oakes had ever been withdrawn. Morrow and Swanborough returned to their seats. **APPROACHED** Oakes said he had been approached about committee chairmanships and had said he would like a rest after his year as warden and would prefer to serve as an ordinary member of two committees unless he was needed as chairman. Morrow and Swanborough exchanged places. Morrow, assuming the chairman's role, said he had

hoped for a more friendly atmosphere around the election of a chairman. He said he hoped no county councillor would suggest any councillor was "green" to council duties after all members had served a year or more in council. Dr. Oakes had mentioned that the chairman would be a "green man" to manor responsibilities. **MANY HOURS** Morrow said he expected to spend many hours on non-committee times with manor administrator Stan Allan on manor duties. Barrett then nominated Miller as deputy chairman of the committee. Miller said he would "gladly withdraw" to give someone else the post because he was already deputy-chairman of the administration committee. Nominations were closed. Miller is deputy chairman.
