**Credits Citizen Group for Peel Corrections**

Judge W. D. August, provincial court judge, held the rapid attention of the Elizabeth Fry membership at Brampton for over an hour last week, as he told of the work in the field of corrections in Peel County.

He gave great credit to a group of concerned citizens who backed him and Neil Latta of the Drug Addiction Foundation, for their efforts to obtain and equip a group home for girls in South Peel. The Williamson farm a group home for boys, had already been established.

The main need of many young people who come before him, he said, is love and an interest in their activities - elements too often lacking in their home.

A volunteer probation service has been started which will be expanded. Each volunteer is assigned two or three young people by a probation officer, with whom they establish a friendship. The probation officers are greatly overworked. There is a waiting list of people trained to work in probation, the need is there, but not enough tax dollars allotted to this department.

The public demands more health services, recreation facilities, better roads and education, which leaves little of the tax dollar for changing and updating our system of justice and rehabilitation of offenders.

Unfortunately, this is a field where general public interest to become involved is small, and this apathy leads to frustration and sometimes hostility for those working to bring change. Judge August has shown what can be done when various segments of the community will pool their resources for a common good.
