Mrs. R. J. Graham is away visiting her granddaughter and husband, Dr. and Mrs. John Peacock at Cherry Wood.

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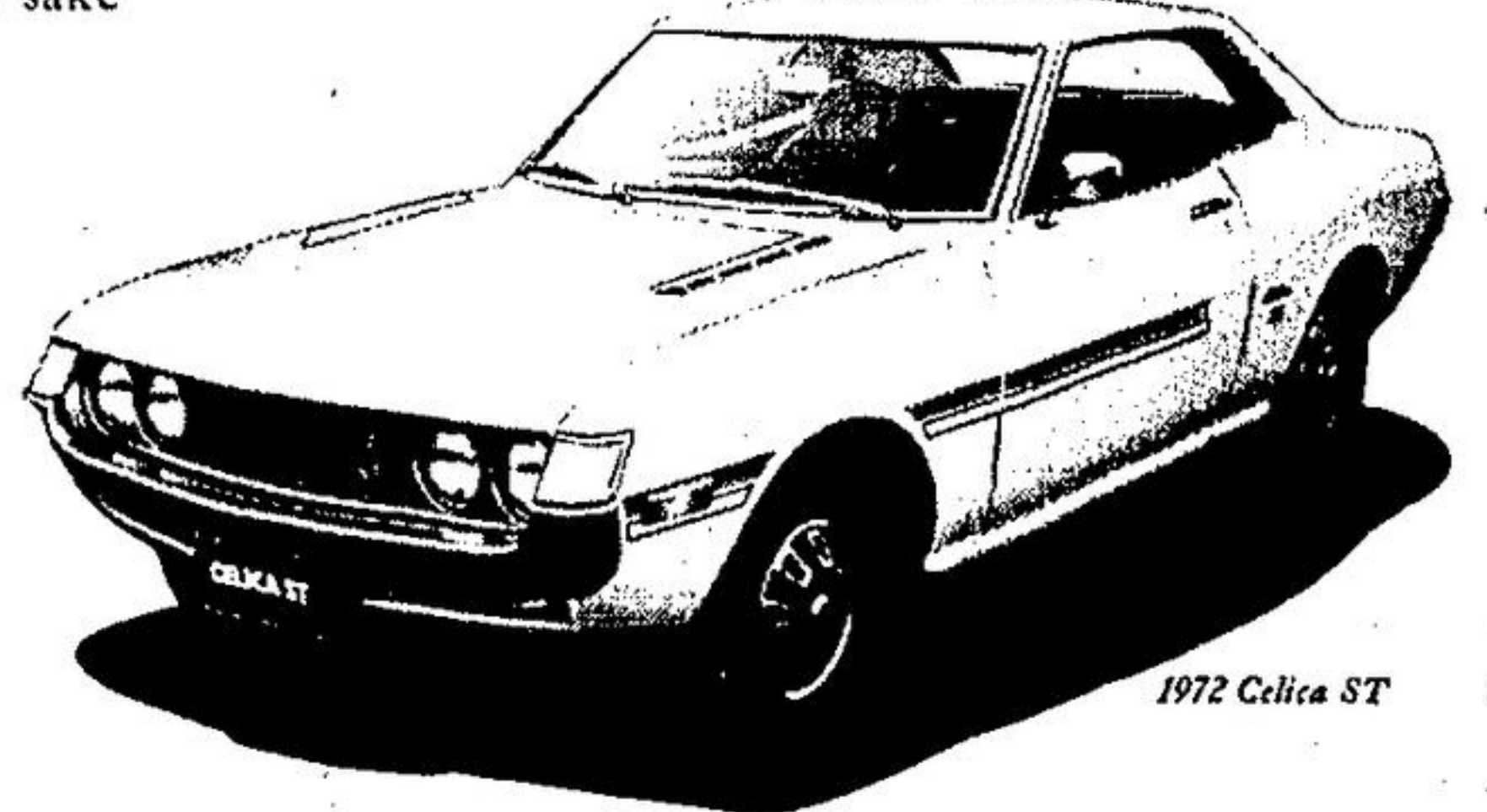


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
