Bennett and Wright electricians finish up the mammoth wiring job necessary in the installation of traffic control lights at the Maple Avenue-Guelph Street corner. The contractor finished the installation Thursday. Caution lights flashed north and south on Guelph Street and stop lights flashed east and west on Maple for five days prior to the lights being activated yesterday. They are the fifth set of traffic control lights installed on town streets.
