## Persistence Locates Missing Dog's Owner

Thanks to an Etobicoke doctor who was convinced that the howling dog he saw on a golf course was lost, an \$850 Siberian husky is back home in Milton again.

The recovery of Northern Star ended a two week air and ground search after the dog slipped his chain February 5 during an exhibition of sled dog teams at Etobicoke's winter carnival.

The dog is owned by Steve French, R.R. 5 Milton.

Dr. J. H. Baillie discovered the dog while walking his own pet on a golf course. Northern Star had his rear leg entangled in the sled harness.

## Snowmobiler Killed at Cheltenham

A 40 year old Alton man was killed Saturday when the snowmobile which he was riding struck a rural mail box.

Chingacousy police said Anthony Simon Oosterwyk, R.R. 1 Alton, was riding on the shoulder of Mill Street in Cheltenham when the mishap occurred.

While there were no witnesses to the accident, police said the man apparently swerved his machine away from the road to avoid a hydro pole but a sudden tilt in the snowbank caused him to swerve back hitting a mail box which had been hidden by the hydro pole.

The man was pronounced dead on arrival at Peel Memorial Hospital in Brampton.

Police report that the man apparently had suffered head injuries.

**ROAMING**  
The doctor had been out of town, but had heard of a news item in the Toronto Star about the missing dog. He called the Star, was shifted to one or two departments unsuccessfully, then tried a radio station, and then an Etobicoke councillor. Next he contacted the mayor, who told him the dog had been lost and referred him to the sponsoring Jaycees. They shifted him to an official of the Siberian Husky club who put him in touch with Mr. French.

The Frenches, who had scoured Halton and Peel counties now believe that their dog may have spent the entire two weeks roaming up and down Mimico Creek valley, less than five miles from where he had run away.

## Writer Says Dentists Here Charge Double City Rates

Dear Mr. Editor:

In reply to my letter of January 21st regarding the high prices being charged for dentures.

Doctor Greenglass of Georgetown in answer says that "the cost of a product or service should not be a prime factor when one's health is concerned".

I ask how can it be other than a prime factor when the product is priced above the average ability to pay, and is so necessary to good health?

If it is presumed by the dentistry profession that they must regain the total costs of their education plus a healthy profit within the first year of operation, then it would appear that this is their objective.

The government recognizes that the cost of dental care is very serious and has stated that because of this, it is impossible to include dental care in the health services program.

I see where Hamilton dentists are preparing plans to supply full dentures at a cost of \$180.00. Let us hope they will be of first quality which such a price should demand in view of the statements of denturists that they could provide full dentures at less than \$100.00.

In conclusion, I recommend that anyone requiring dental services check what the profession in this county is charging in comparison to centres such as Toronto and Hamilton. In these centres the overhead is much greater, yet prices in some instances are only one third to one half of those charged here. Buy where you can save your hard-earned money.
