Kelly's the grade five pupil at St. Dominic's Separate School, Oakville, who represented Halton County in the Oral Communications festival semi-finals in Alliston, recently, and took first place.

The public speaking festival is sponsored by the Ontario School Trustees Association and the Ontario Hydro, with pupils first competing within the class, then public and separate and finally the county.

WARM, FUNNY
None of the 'M's for the Million ways' line for Kelly. In her speech on what Mothers are like Kelly makes Mom a

warm, funny human being. To begin with Mothers take baths without the company of the family fish or frog, but fix kid's baths. "So hot they shrink them", states Kelly.

FAVOURITE QUESTION
"One of her favorite questions is 'What do you want for breakfast?' You reply hopefully, pizza and a tall cool root beer. When you get to the table you've got scrambled eggs, bacon and juice."

"A mother asks if you like her new fashion wig and naturally you say no because she looks like she belongs to some other kid."

HIGH HOUSE?
Some days you come home from school and you're not sure you have the right house. Mother is the first one to find out what you don't want anyone to know, according to Kelly. "She says, 'Hush sweetheart' when you have company and 'Pipe down' when it's just you and her", Kelly goes on.

WHAT ELSE IS MOTHER?
Well "She has x-ray eyes. She can see a bedroom light on at 10 p.m., right through a closed door."

"She also tells you over and over again you need four glasses of milk a day and she only drinks one ounce in her coffee."

Best of all: "A mother smiles and hugs because she is understanding and constant with a heart full of love and a mind full of patience."

If it comes through that there is a genuine, informal but sincere love between these two O'Neills, that's the way they operate.

PROUD
Pat O'Neill couldn't be prouder of her daughter. Nor could her father Carl.

There's a casual rapport between the two as they sit and talk about school and the teachers at St. Dominic's who are great.

Or about Kelly's next competitive venture, this time with her sister Tammy in the Peel County music festival.

BIT OF A HAM
Both girls sing and play the guitar and both have walked away with medals for their talent. Tammy with a bronze in her class, Kelly with the gold medal for her age group.

Is she nervous when she gets up to make her three-minute speech in front of an audience? "Not at all", assures her mother. "She sometimes gets butterflies before going to make it. But she never worries when she's making it. Actually she's a bit of a ham. She loves it."

ADVANTAGE
Kelly does have one advantage in public speaking. She's already made public appearances, playing guitar and

singing at the Cozy Dining Lounge in Burlington during the dinner hours for two weeks last fall. She's also performed at the Optimists picnic and entertained the senior citizens at Milton Manor during the Christmas holidays.

BIG AMBITION
Quite naturally, her big ambition is to be a singer when she finishes school. Right now it's country western style that most appeals. But who is to say what 10 years will bring in change in style.

She's equally enthusiastic about horseback riding, spending every minute she can spare riding "a horse that's bigger than the one Dad rides".

LOVES TO COOK
And because she loves to cook (meals, snacks and cookies) her parents gave her a Betty Crocker cookbook for her speech-making win.

County's Wheat Growers Meet

Brian Lillierop, R.R.1 Burlington was chosen as committee man from Halton County to the Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board. He replaces Roy Coulter who held this position for many years. Alternate committee man is Tom Foster, R.R.3 Campbellville.

The Halton Wheat Producers met along with the directors of the Halton Federation of Agriculture in the Agricultural Office, Milton on February 17. Bill Brander of Peel County, the

1st vice-president of the marketing board, discussed the current wheat situation. He stated that just over one million bushels of winter wheat is in storage at the moment, a considerable improvement over the previous year.

The Ontario Wheat Producers' Marketing Board has sold the following quantities of wheat in 1971:

Ontario Wheat Producers are looking for a considerable increase in the price of wheat during the coming year in line with the Federal Government's announcement of \$3.00 per bushel for all wheat consumed domestically. Approximately 60 percent of the Ontario wheat is used for human consumption. Details of the subsidy have not yet been worked out.

Ontario Wheat Producers are cautioned not to greatly increase their production or benefits from the subsidy could be greatly reduced.
