Even Lake Trout Sometimes Like To Scratch Their Backs



LAKE SIMCOE

Some good catches of trout and whitefish have been taken from Lake Simcoe lately. The ice is much safer now and people travel with more confidence.

The Department of Lands and Forests has this to say:

LAKE TROUT "LIONS"

If you are a Lake Simcoe ice fisherman, or pursuing this popular winter sport on any lake known to abound in lake trout, better keep a sharp lookout down that hole.

These known deep water fish, which prefer the lower depths ranging from 60 to 120 feet down in summer, frequently hit the high spots when temperatures drop in the fall and winter their wanderings. At these times, lakers will gobble up perch, suckers, minnows and other fish species found only in shallow waters.

The water is so clear at this time of year, many anglers spot the large lake trout swimming about and actually biting at the bait or lure.

One fish hut operator who is an experienced ice fisherman teases the lake trout to rush at the bait. He waits until the trout is about to nip the bait and then pulls it away causing the fish to become more aggressive and actually lunge at the bait, snapping it up ferociously.

VULNERABLE

During some years the trout will gather together in schools and when swimming about in a group they become vulnerable to ice fishermen.

Most of the fish huts are set up in small communities and if a school of lake trout passes under while the huts are occupied the fish will begin to gulp at the dangling baits or lures with

resulting good catches.

Although the trout begin to roam widely in the winter time the areas of deep water are still the best fishing holes for them. They can, of course, be found elsewhere. Often fishermen angling for pike in the shallow waters of Cook Bay on Lake Simcoe are dumbfounded to pull out a large lake trout. It's a fish story they talk about for months.

THIRTY POUNDER

In recent years the largest known lake trout caught weighed 30 pounds. It was landed by a lady fishing off the western shore of Innisfil Township. In research trap nets operated by the Department of Lands and Forests trout from 34 to 35 inches long have been recorded.

These fish rolled and thrashed about in the nets like big fat pigs. It almost took two men to lift them out of the net and release them into the lake. Last winter, anglers caught some 17 and 18

pounders but most of them were in the 10 and 15 pound range. These are still fish worth boasting about.

SCRATCH BACKS

Many oldtimers who constantly fish throughout the winter watch the lake trout swimming just below the ice and swear that these big finny lions come up to rub their backs on the ice. Such speculations have sometimes been proven true according to Allan Wainio, Maple District biologist.

Most people are convinced that the wind and current split the ice. "That may be wrong," Al says. "Perhaps these cracks are caused by some enormous lakers rubbing their backs on the ice and enjoying it so much that they begin to heave and buck in ecstasy and end up splitting the ice."
