**TOO MANY DEER?**  
Several councillors asked if the deer were becoming over populated in number and received no definite answer.

Councillor Jim Yarrow suggested that if the deer were becoming too many in numbers that the township could bring in professional hunters.

The suggestion drew no support from the other councillors. In opposing the three-day hunting season, councillor Leonard Butt said that often the people would shoot Jersey cattle instead of deer.

**RELEASE CHICKS**  
The committee also voted in

favour of releasing 100 pheasant chicks in the township.

Several councillors said they were concerned about the ability of the birds to survive but were told they would be old enough to take care of themselves.

Councillor Yarrow again expressed a concern about the number of birds to which the reeve replied, "Do you think we are going to be over-run by pheasants?"

Similar number of birds have been released in the township in previous years.

proposal.

In asking for the hunting season, the correspondence from the provincial department said that approximately 100 deer were killed in the Maple District in 1971 by motor vehicles.
