# Foresters Get "Cooked" Monday Raiders Take 3-1 Series Lead

## Niagara District's "A" Semi Returns to Brantford Friday

When you're hot you're hot, and it was a red hot Terry Cooke who cooled out Brantford Foresters with a four goal performance here Monday night enabling Georgetown's North Halton Raiders to move into a 3-1 lead in the Niagara District Intermediate A League's A semifinal series.

Cooke's winning recipe left a bitter taste in the mouths of the favoured Brantfords who were forced to swallow a 7-1 whipping in front of a Memorial Arena crowd of just over 900.

Twenty-four hours earlier a capacity crowd witnessed Raiders' 5-4 victory. That one regained for them the series lead which had disappeared when Brantford fashioned a 9-5 win in Brantford, their only one of four series starts.

It was a frustrating fourth game for the Foresters who missed the starting time by a quarter of an hour after battling wet snow, and then watched their attack disintegrate under Raider checking. They were behind after a little over a minute and had the

winning goal scored on them after just five and a half minutes.

**BEATEN LOOK**

The Foresters had the beaten look when they carried the weight of a 4-1 deficit off at the end of one period, and never looked like the team that could erase the difference. Raiders found their fifth goal in the second period and six and seven came early in the third.

Blake Inglis, Steve Blundy and Al Rachon scored the balance of Raiders' goals. Inglis was the ice-bugger that started things. Blundy's was Raiders' third and prompted Brantford coach John Torti to lift Stan Worosz from the nets in favour of Bob Aitken who didn't fare any better. The shot threaded Worosz's pad from a sharp angle. Rachon's goal, Raiders' seventh, rose from the blue line and cleared Aitken's left shoulder with 12 minutes of scoreless play left.

**OUTRAGED**

Cooke scored twice in the first period and once in each of the remaining frames. He outraced Aitken to a loose puck near the

Brantford blue line, and then gofited it through defenders' legs while being checked to the ice near the boards on the north side.

Henry Hunting spoiled Keith Pallett's perfect night when he scored as Georgetown's defence relaxed momentarily with a 4-0 lead and three minutes left in the first period.

The chippy play kept the partial home crowd vocal after Raiders put the outcome beyond doubt. Bill Gratton (No. 11) and John Gignac (No. 9) became the targets for the needle tossers when they released their frustration on any passing red and white uniform.

Gratton drew the game's only major when he charged and then hammered Raiders' Ron Lane after Lane cross-checked another greenshirt. Gratton served a minor and major while Lane took a double minor.

**QUICK START**

Brantford got a quick start and

it took a come from behind effort by Georgetown to engineer Sunday night's 5-4 victory. The visitors had a 2-0 edge in the seventh minute after Simeppel and Moran found defensive holes. But it was a new game at the start of the second period.

Jim Blair and then Paul Robinson provided the catch-up goals, and Duffy McCarthy made it 3-2 Raiders with the only goal of the second period at the half way mark.

Brantford matched Raiders' two-goal final period. After Gignac's slap shot chopped Georgetown's lead to 5-4 with 4:55 to go in the third period the time dragged for anxious clock-watchers. But Brantford never threatened to force an overtime period after that last thrust.

Al Stitt and Terry Cooke were Raiders' third period snipers. Moran scored twice and Simeppel once before Gignac.

A disastrous second period went a long way toward Raiders' 9-5 setback in game two in Brantford Friday night. They absorbed four goals in a span of three minutes, three of them in 38 seconds, in the middle stanza which broke a tight game wide open. It was 3-2 in Foresters' favour when the roof fell in.

**RESTED**

Inglis was used sparingly here Sunday, but saw lots of action Monday night. Coach Gerry Inglis rested Doug Richardson Friday and Sunday, but used him late in Monday's game. Raiders' fifth defenseman, Tom Hicks has been a spectator since the series started. The flu bug forced Duffy McCarthy to miss Monday's tilt, but he is expected to be ready for tomorrow night's clash.

Brantford had an 8-3 bulge on their floundering visitors.

Gignac and Andy Moran each wound up with hat tricks. Henry Hunting, Jim Reid and Jack Powell contributed singles. Blundy, Blair, Paul Robinson, Cotton and Blake Inglis launched the five that beat Worosz.

In the other Niagara District League series, Dunnville has bounced Port Colborne in four games, and Dundas and Welland are knotted at 2 games apiece. Those are both best of five affairs. Port Colborne will meet Welland or Dundas in another three-of-five set the winner of that one to face Raiders or Brantford for the group title.
