Children from outside of town
have paid no fee at all for the last
three years. Adults had been
charged \$4 a year, but this too,
was dropped to \$2 at the same
time. This \$2 charge included the
whole family.

In anticipation of the establish-
ment of the Esqueing Library
Board, and the resultant share of
the grant, Georgetown dropped
all non-resident fees at the end of
1971.
