Before You Dig Read This About Fish Farming

The Department of Lands & Forests provides technical advice to any resident of Ontario interested in operating a private fish-pond, fishing preserve or a private fish hatchery.

When requested a fisheries biologist of the department will inspect a property and advise on its suitability to sustain a fishery.

His recommendations may include site preparation, water requirements, selection of fish species, sources of fish stocks, production potential and basic operating procedures.

Ontario regulations have been established to protect native fish stocks. They prohibit the sale of diseased fish, restrict the importing or exporting of live fish and spawn, and control the transfer of fish species within the Province.

FISH PONDS

Whether inhabited by wild or stocked fish, waters on private lands are subject to The Game and Fish Act and the Ontario Fishery Regulations. The owner, his guests or other anglers must conform to all regulations governing fishing seasons and possession limits. The owner may charge anglers a rod or trespass fee for the privilege of fishing on his property. No licence or special permission is required.

If excessive plant growth is choking the pond, it may be controlled in a number of ways. Before any chemical herbicide (fungicide, etc) may be applied to the waters, however, a permit must be obtained from the Ontario Water Resources Commission.
