Document Reveals

North Halton was Choice For New Jet Airport

A government document made public Monday shows that a federal task force in 1970 recommended against Pickering as the site of a second airport for Toronto.

Transport Minister Don Jamieson and Ontario Treasurer Darcy McKeough announced March 2 that Pickering has been

selected, a decision that has aroused controversy.

Clark Muirhead, an Uxbridge township councillor opposed to the Pickering site, made the report public.

It was prepared within the federal transport department with the assistance of Parkin

Associates of Toronto, a consulting firm. The councillor refused to say how he obtained it.

NEAR MILTON
The report says the task force did not consider Pickering a possible site because it met none of the basic requirements.

Of 59 sites considered the task force reported in detail on only four. It recommended one west of Metro between Guelph and Milton as "considerably more attractive than the remaining alternatives when all factors are considered."

Accident Total \$4,645 Driver, Passenger Hurt

Accidents at the Guelph-Mountainview corner Saturday and at a Georgetown Market Guelph Street entrance last Thursday resulted in injury. Damage was put at \$600 to the front of Boudreau's 1966 Volkswagen and \$80 to the back of the 1966 Bellet driven by William Ray Rogers of 26 Stevens Crescent. Thursday, Mark Townsend, age seven, suffered minor hurts when the car he was riding in, driven by Charlotte H. Townsend of 29 Gower, was in collision with a car driven by Brian Glenn Shoebridge at the Market entrance. Police said the Shoebridge car, a 1966 Dodge, received \$60 damage and the Townsend car, a 1968 Volkswagen, \$170.

A hundred and fifty dollars damage was done to a 1969 Pontiac driven by Gerald Clarke of R.R.4, Brampton, and \$50 to a 1962 Chev driven by Frederick McDonald of 20 Durham Street when they hit in the Guelph-Mountainview intersection, Sunday.

A 1971 Chevelle driven by Raymond Pentland was stopped at the Mountainview Road exit from the Georgetown Market parking lot when a 1970 Ford driven by Brian Caldwell of 8 Garnet sid into the back end of it Thursday. A car belonging to Miguel Viera of 40 Hewson Crescent received \$200 damage and one driven by Warren Chard of 14 Elizabeth Street \$75 in an accident April 4 on Elizabeth Street. Viera's 1965 Chev was parked. Chard's 1967 Chev was backing from a driveway.

A 1969 Dodge dart driven by Hank Fong of 92 Sargent Road was northbound on Market Street near William, and a 1971 GMC driven by Dean Carson Painter of 16 Ontario Street southbound on Market when they collided Thursday resulting in \$900

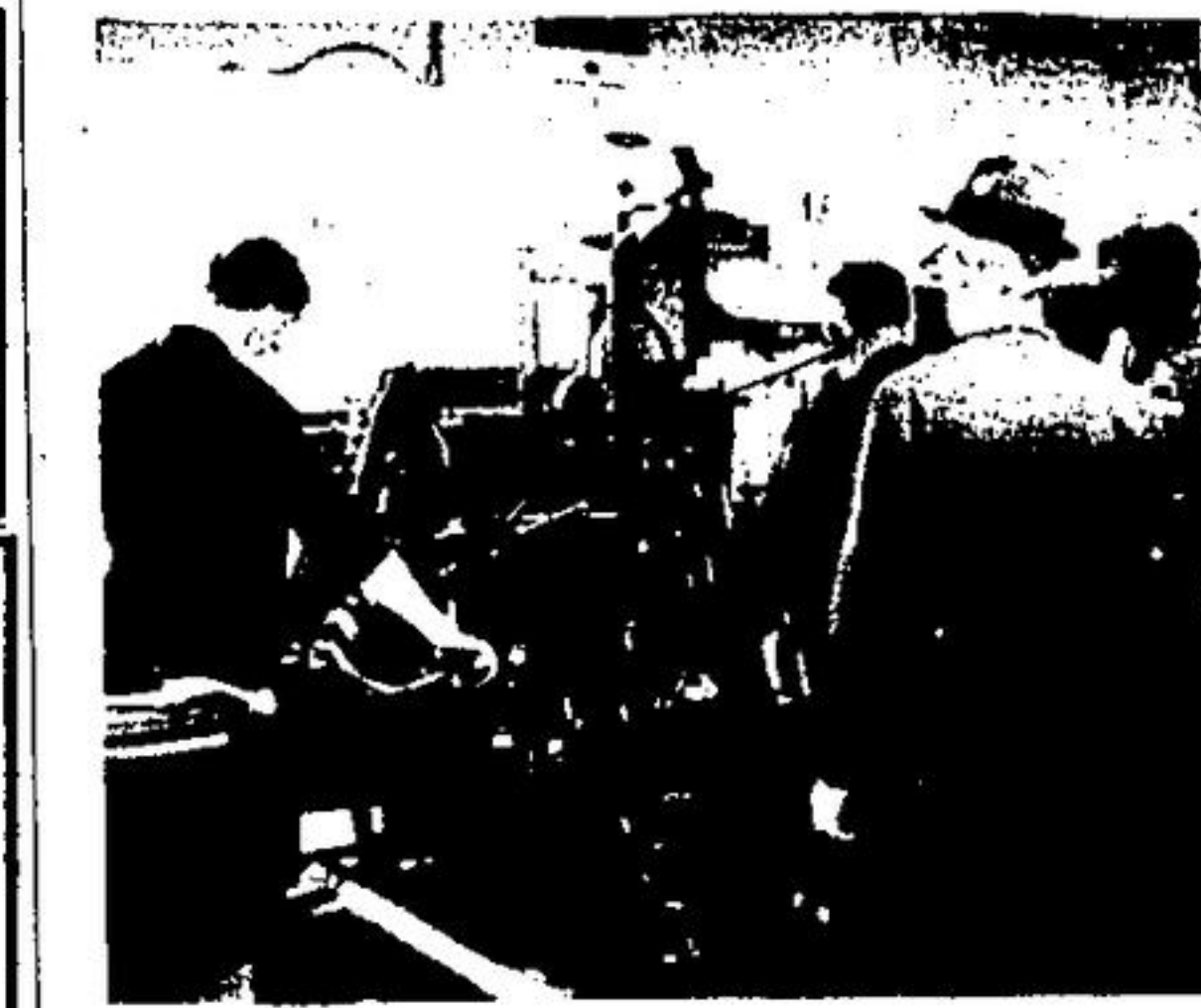
CARNATION DAYS

Was Carpenter, G. Hulsbos Dies

Partner in a carpentry business until he retired 10 years ago, George Hulsbos, 48 River Drive, died suddenly April 4. He was 75.
Coming from Holland in 1948, Mr. Hulsbos followed his trade of carpenter here. He was in partnership with Jake Vandermeer, building and repairing buildings in and around the community. Born in Haarlemmermeer, Holland, he was the son of Jan Hulsbos and Jorina Weststeyn. He attended elementary and trade school there, and farmed before taking up the carpentry trade. He lived at Mallon and Brampton when he first emigrated, then moved to Georgetown.

Mr. Hulsbos served in the first World War. He was a member of the Christian Reformed Church. He leaves his wife, Grace Hulsbos. He was the last member of a family of 6 brothers and two sisters.
Rev. A. J. VanDenPol conducted the funeral service in the Christian Reformed Church Friday and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were P. Weststeyn, A. Schouten, J. Vandermeer, J. Ouwendyk, J. Blekkhorst and A. Weststeyn.
