

# Committee Asks School Students To Put Name on Town Celebration

For the past several weeks, the Anniversary Committee has been asking for name suggestions for Georgetown's 50th Birthday Celebration coming up this July 1 long weekend. Only a few name suggestions have come in and the committee felt none were catchy and inspiring enough or particularly unique to Georgetown. Due to the lack of response from the citizens of the area it was decided at last week's meeting that a contest aimed at the school level was in order. The contest is now on, all elementary and secondary school students are eligible, a prize for the name selected will be a season's pass to the Georgetown swimming pool. Students are requested to send their suggestions along with their name, school and grade to: Anniversary Committee, P.O. Box 62, Georgetown. Closing date for the contest is April 30, 1972.

**ESSAY CONTEST**  
The schools all received a letter indicating that an essay contest would be apropos at this time. They agreed and requested the title to be "A Day in the Life of a Boy or Girl in 1922." There will be three categories - up to and including Grade 4, Grades 5 and 6 and Grades 7 and 8. The essay is to be 500 words in length. Essays from each category will be selected from each school, and then they will be judged collectively and the winning essay will be announced and prizes awarded July 1.

**TO HOSPITAL**  
It was decided at last week's meeting that all monies from the Anniversary Celebration will go to the Georgetown hospital and will be used specifically to equip the physiotherapy department of the new wing. A brass plaque will

be inscribed and placed approximately on the entrance of the physiotherapy department. The Committee had a pleasant interruption at last week's meeting when Rev. Kelvin Johnston, of Georgetown dropped in to play a song which he had written. The song, about Georgetown celebrating its 50th Anniversary as a town was catchy and inspiring. The Committee later decided to send out this open invitation to any and all citizens of this area who are inclined musically to send or bring their songs to the Committee, by contacting P.O. Box 62, Georgetown. The song or songs best depicting Georgetown's festival occasion will be used in conjunction with their radio advertising.

## "Don't Realize Your Power" University Women Are Told

"Women don't realize their power," stated Mrs. H. R. Fisher, President of the Ontario Branch of the Consumers Association of Canada, when she spoke to the Women's University Club of Milton and District at the Pineview School Library, introduced by Mrs. Joan Mason of Georgetown.

Women's complaints to the Consumers Association have changed the packaging of bread and as a result baby food is now available in jars. Women's protests have created the Canada Standard Sizes for Children which took years to develop. Mary Robinson from the Ontario Executive is now working for European standard sizes for children and standard sizing for women is being planned.

Mrs. Fisher traced the history of the Association and its accomplishments. In 1941 the federal government established a volunteer organization of women's groups to help maintain price ceilings under the War and Prices Board. In 1947 the Canadian Consumers Association of Canada was

formed and in 1964 the monthly magazine, Canadian Consumer, was published, establishing a testing program for Canada similar to that in the American magazine, Consumer Reports.

**COMPLAINTS**  
The Canadian Association of Consumers is purely a voluntary organization which works in conjunction with the Federal Government's new Corporate and Consumers Affairs Branch which was established in 1967.

Complaints may be sent to the Federal Government at Box 99, Ottawa, or Mr. Pilgrim, the Deputy Minister for Ontario, or the C.A.C.

Presently in Ontario there are 35,000 members in 20 locals of C.A.C. working on municipal boards, taking surveys, and checking complaints. The latest problem is safety on school buses. Mrs. Fisher invited interested persons to contact the C.A.C.

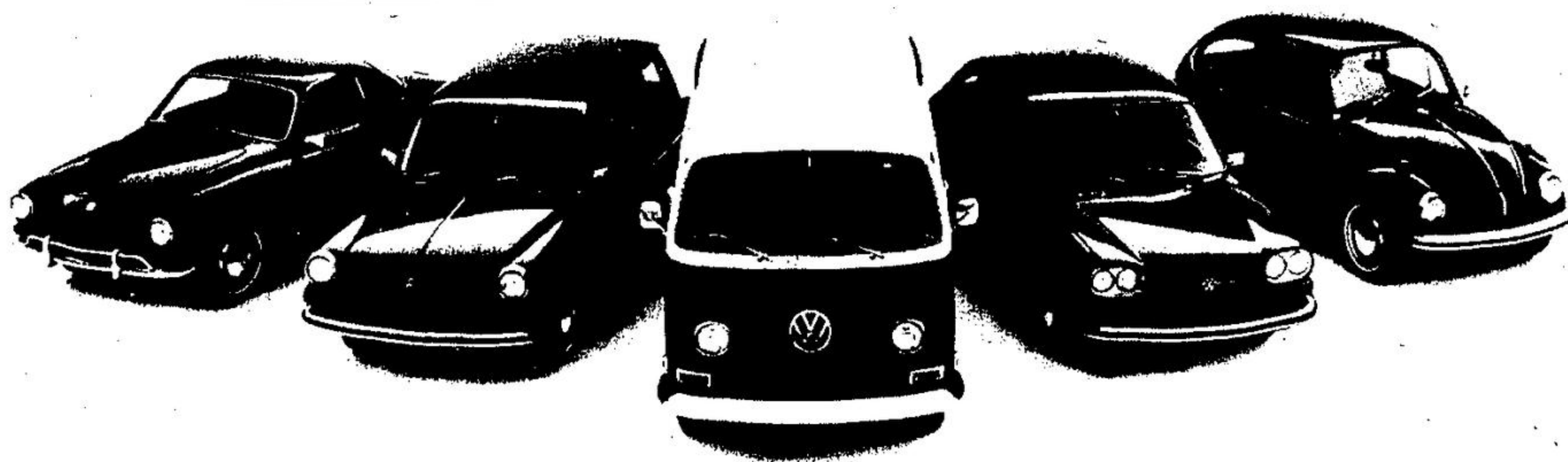
