

**Girls Gymnastic Meet**

**Declared Second, Georgetown Wins Halton Title in Recount**

Georgetown High School topped all others in the county-wide gymnastic meet here Saturday, to be declared Halton county champions after a mistake in scoring had them announced as second to M. M. Robinson. The rechecked score showed Georgetown team racked up 239.46 points as opposed to M. M. Robinson's 231.95. Ten schools took part.

The local girl's team made a clean sweep of the all-around championships winning all three classes. Kerri Hegstrom won the Novice, Jennifer Linton, the

Junior and Eva Katterwe, the senior.

They also captured two of the three, second place all-around awards, with Stephanie Lister winning the Junior award, and Sylvia Katterwe, the Senior. To be eligible for the all-around competition a gymnast must compete in every event.

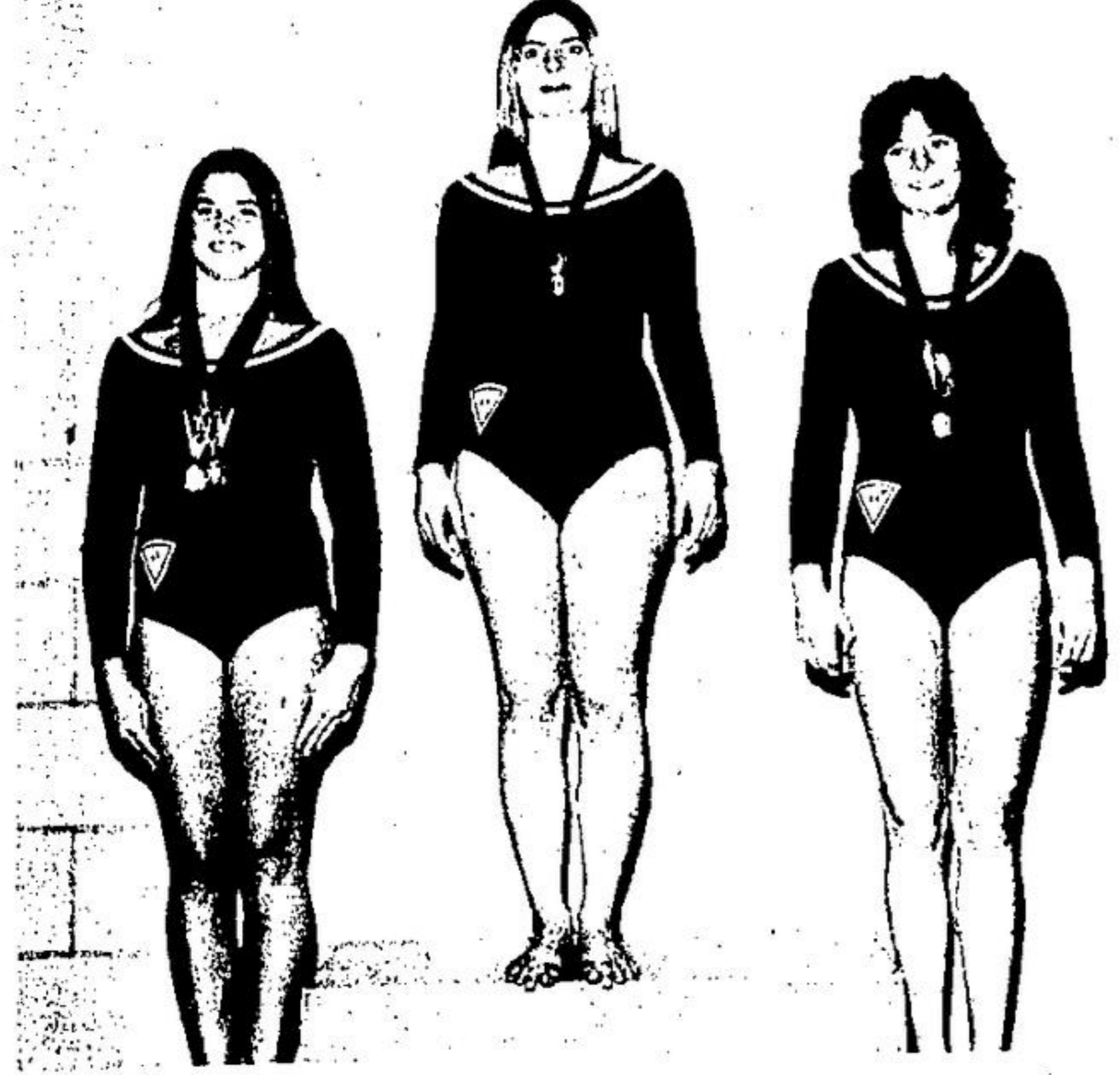

**Georgetown Withhold's CVCA Levy**

**Hungry Hollow Dam Removed From Conservation Program**

Despite the objection of Cr. Ernie Sykes, council's representative on the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, council decided to hold up payment of their \$14,338 levy for the year.

"This is the fee for membership in the club," remarked Cr. Sykes, as he pointed out the Recreation Committee and the Planning Board, whom council have asked for consultation, wouldn't change anything, as the levy has to be paid.

The mayor admitted he knew the levy had to be paid, and the town intended to pay it, but he said he felt the Authority should be doing more for the town.

"I understood Alex Blackwell, our other representative on the Authority to say the whole system of dams has been thrown out and we were never told about it," said the mayor.

He suggested the Recreation

Committee and the Planning Board could suggest something the town needs, so that a formal application could be made to the Authority.

**TOWN'S FAULT**

Cr. Ern Hyde pointed out the levy was mandatory. He said Georgetown had not asked the Authority for anything.

"We asked for a park some years ago and the Authority agreed. It was council itself that scuppered it," he commented. He remarked that the non-payment wouldn't endear the town to the Authority.

Cr. Sykes said he had never heard any mention of a dam for Georgetown since he had been on council. He emphasized the Authority's prime concern is clean water. He pointed out they are only an intermediate body between council and the province.

"If we want something they are sitting back only too happy to consider any proposal we have," he added.

Sykes continued, saying "If we want to propose a dam we must be willing to pay 45 percent or 47 percent. The province pays 50 percent and the Authority pays the rest."

**HUNGRY HOLLOW**

"I'm glad you said that," replied the mayor. "I've sat here 10 years and nobody has ever come back to us and told us this."

He blamed past representatives for the lack of knowledge.

Cr. Harry Levy said he, too, was under the impression a dam at Hungry Hollow was on the Authority's schedule to be done.

"Maybe we should make formal application for it," he added.

**CAN'T PAY**

Cr. Ern Hyde said the original dam scheme was for the whole watershed, and was not to be financed in the usual manner.

The final comment was made by Cr. Sykes, who said, "Now you've voted to hold it up, you can't pay till the Planning Board and Recreation Committee are through with it."
