Folk Club Delights Large GDHS Audience

Wednesday evening an audience of 350 adults and students was entertained by members of the high school folk club.

Gord Fendley was emcee for the first half of the show, and Ron Fiddler took on this duty for the second half. Sitting in a rocking chair at centre stage they did an excellent job, keeping the show moving with lively commentary.

Gord favoured the audience with some Cat Stevens selections and introduced his new song "The Jester". Ron played some traditional numbers on his banjo and then performed his "Cat Song", a favourite with the audience.

Many different performers provided exciting variety. Sage, a top-notch local group, presented new numbers "The Boxer" and "Tell It All" in addition to the three songs that made the group winners at the Kawartha Festival.

The Bullfrog Band warmed up the audience with comedy selections. Jesse, a female trio from Don Mills, guests for the evening, sang the numbers, including the popular "Halter Skate Song". A group called Mr. Broughton's Gang, sang several soldier songs, then came on later with their version of "Carolina on my Mind".

Individual performers featured included Betty Tripp, who sang "Woodstock"; Jorge Lasso, who developed quite a cheering section for his instrumental work and comedy rendition of "Time Stands Still"; Cindy Stafford, who received thunderous applause for "I Don't Know How to Love Him" from the score of "Superstar", and her version of "Anticipation"; Iris (Clinton), who sang "You've Got a Friend" and "Wild World"; Dave Douglas, who, in Dylan-fashion sang "Saint Augustine"; Mr. Gehlbach, a musically talented teacher, who had the audience laughing with his version of "Draft Dodge Blues"; and Mr. Broughton the folk club supervisor, who sang an Irish favourite "Tim Finnegan's Wake".

Three duet acts were also included. Cindy Stafford and Iris Clinton reunited the audience with their version of Carol King's "Will you Love me Tomorrow"; Jan-Hilber and Lisa Collins sang James Taylor's "Fire and Rain"; Bryan Day and Jorge Lasso came on strong with an instrumental medley ending in a version of Feliciano's "Light My Fire".

Lighting, under control of Roger Reed, was excellent. The sound system was a must for a folk concert, was kept in perfect tune by William Leder, Larry Thompson and Paul Subject.

The folk club will be performing at several events in the near future. Club members will sing at an art show at the high school Monday and Tuesday evenings. Sage has been asked to sing at a Mariposa Folk Festival preview here at the high school May 27. The club is busy preparing for various Channel 5 TV shows and the July 1 weekend celebrations marking Georgetown's 50th anniversary as a town.

Pentecostal Speaker Ministered in Europe
 "The Bible Behind The Iron Curtain" will be the subject discussed when Richard Michalski speaks at Georgetown Pentecostal Church next Tuesday evening.

With his wife, he is travelling across the United States and Canada representing Christian Mission Publishers.

Would Build Another Car Wash on No. 7
 An application for a second car wash at 243 Guelph Street, a short distance from where a car wash is now under construction, was referred to council, by the general committee last Monday night.

G.A.S. Developments originally applied for a building permit for a car wash last October, and received a building permit in November. At that time, after the other car wash went ahead, they returned the building permit and had the \$15,000 cheque they had posted to cover the cost of sewer services refunded.
