## New Shelter, Better Entrance

### \$6,000 Grant For Work At Terra Cotta Park

Natural Resources Minister Leo Bernier and the Honourable William G. Davis, Premier of Ontario announced the approval of a provincial grant of \$6,000 to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority for the Terra Cotta Conservation Area, and \$12,500 for the Bellfountain Conservation Area this week.

The Terra Cotta conservation area comprises 500 acres of land in the Township of Esquesing and

Township of Chinguacousy. The Authority is proposing to further develop this area by way of constructing a picnic shelter, developing the south parking area, improving the park entrance, park service area and a small pond.

Belfountain conservation area is situated on the Credit River in the Township of Caledon, County of Peel. It comprises some 33

acres of land.

The Authority is proposing to carry out further capital development work in this area which will include construction of a washroom and change room building, a gatehouse and storage building, and landscaping.

All member municipalities will bear the Authority's share of the cost.

## 21 Year Old Unchallenged

### New Democrats Acclaim Alcock Halton Candidate

The New Democratic Party Monday night chose 21-year-old Stephen Alcock to contest Halton riding in the soon-expected federal election.

Alcock was acclaimed as candidate by 35 members of the Halton NDP riding association at a meeting in Milton. The association has a membership of about 200.

Alcock, an employee at Ontario Yachts of Oakville is the son of Norman Z. Alcock, head of the Canadian Peace Research Institute.

The NDP candidate will face Liberal incumbent Rud Whiting and Progressive Conservative Terry O'Connor.

Alcock said, "There are a great many problems facing our society, farming to economic problems to the treatment of minority groups. There are policies which I hope to elaborate upon very soon in our riding."

"I was faced with two choices," he explained. "One was to get involved and the other to opt out."

He said he decided on the former because no matter where you are in Canada, you are affected by national policies.

"Four years ago, Pierre Trudeau campaigned on a platform of a just society...I've been disappointed. The NDP is

the only party to bring about a just society"
