


Cedarvale community centre was the scene of a full day's activity Saturday when the Minor Soccer Association kicked-off their 1972 schedule with a full slate of games in each division.

sound off. Some time ago a friend of mine made a statement that worms were the best in early season. Personally I detest using worms, and I detest having to use frogs more so. In fact I won't use them anymore for bass. Hooking a frog through the lips, and having to watch it claw at the hook with its front feet, is more than I can stand. Mother Nature is more cruel of course.

Speaking of fishing techniques reminds me of a particular opening of the trout season some years ago. The place Cheltenham dam - the time daylight and a cold frosty morning, which caused ice in the rod guides. Conditions prevailing river a little above normal, cold and clear. One local angler advised us it wasn't much use - they just weren't hitting - water was too cold or something. My brother Charlie and Bill Ritchie were my companions. We decided to give it a try.

I was using a drab coloured bucktall with two split shot on the leader to make it sink. Out of three tries I had a pair of Browns, both over 2 lbs. The local angler shook his head and said he would come back after he went home and thawed himself out, and perhaps to root a drab coloured fly from the tackle box.
PURISTS WOULD

FROWN Fishing a bucktail deep to imitate a nymph or some underwater bug is not the best in fly fishing. In fact some dry fly purists would frown at the method. However like worms, it puts trout in the creel, Fishing with a fly is much better from a conservation viewpoint. Small trout can be released much

easter unharmed. Fishing with bait in a body of water that has newly stocked trout, can be murder. Once they have swallowed the hook and you want to get the trout back, the only thing to do is nip the leader at the hook or close to the mouth and release it. The digestive juices will dissolve the hook in a very short time. Hard to believe,

but true. One way to prevent small trout from being hooked is to make sure there is an ample supply of bait on the hook at all times. This

is a very good practice when season here Saturday.



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
