Of course we all protested, including some of his companions. Finally, after a hot argument, they were dumped out and trampled in the mud.

At that time the only known fish in this lake were specks up to ten of twelve pounds, and as small as 1 1/2" and smaller. It was not uncommon to see schools of small trout-fly swimming along shore line. Also present were two types of darter minnows, one a stickle-back and the other a shiner, both small, not longer than 1 1/2".
