Ukrainian Camp Gets Building Go Ahead

The Ukrainian Youth Camp, lot 31, Con. 5, will be allowed to build a new administration building and a chapel, provided the present administration building is demolished by June 1, 1973. Esquering council decided Monday night.

Walter Reka, a representative of the camp, who appeared before council two weeks ago on the same errand, told council they had been holding church services outside, but found it inconvenient due to either a hot sun or rain.

"Our camp is based on highly moral and ethical principles, and we feel a chapel is a must," he said. Reeve Tom Hill pointed out that council had asked him if they were willing to tear down the old building when the new one was completed and he had refused.

"If that's the only stumbling block we will give you assurance we will tear it down as soon as the new one is finished," replied Reka.

Julian Sumyk, accompanying Reka, said the chapel would be finished this year, but he couldn't give an exact date for the completion of the administration building. He reminded council the members do all the work themselves.

After council agreed to give the building permits for both buildings provided the present one is demolished by June 1, next year, Reeve Tom Hill commented, "There'll be another religious service up there unless it is torn down."
