**Seek Sub-Letting Approval**

**Would Make Forge Into Art Studio**

A request from Chinguacousy Township, relayed to Peel County's General 2 committee Thursday by Deputy-revee Terry Miller, that approval be given for sub-letting the Forge building and property at Terra Cotta for

an art studio, was deferred pending study of the sublease. "How much is Chinguacousy going to make out of this deal?" asked one councillor. The Forge building and property was leased to Chingu-

acousy in 1971 for \$1 with the proviso that the township obtain county approval prior to any sub-letting.

**AGAINST IT** Deputy-revee Miller, told committee that terms of the lease with the art studio were not fully approved by township council. He said further representation would be made to

council when the terms are settled. "I am against leasing a building or property to any municipally, then seeing the municipally make money on it", said Mayor Charles Murray, Mississauga.

**LOCAL CITIZENS** Deputy-revee Miller told committee that the art studio

was for the purpose of promoting the creative activities of local citizens and the program would include art shows and instruction.

"The Forge building and property will be kept neat and tidy", he reported. Approval in principle was granted subject to submission of sub-lease figures to the county.

1. Before you start decorating be honest with yourself about your likes and dislikes, know what effect you want, and use furniture and colors that suit you and your family's lifestyle.
2. Don't try to redecorate your home all at once, do one room at a time and do it well.
3. Remember when decorating a room to scale the furniture to the size of the room.
4. Buy basic furniture pieces when starting out. Keep them simple so they can be rearranged easily to fit into any future decor.
5. To create a color scheme take inspiration from the wallpaper or any printed fabric you have chosen to decorate with.
6. With a limited budget splurge on color. It's the least expensive yet most effective of all decorating tools.
7. If you have an off centered door hide it by wallpapering the door the same as the wall.
8. Believe it or not, but matching wall paper, drapery fabric and bedspread make a small bedroom appear larger.
9. For a dramatic effect paint cornice, mouldings, baseboard, and doors in a room a contrasting color to the walls.
10. A narrow hallway with giant diagonal stripes painted on the walls will make it appear larger. If you wish a more dramatic effect, continue the stripes over ceiling or floor.
11. Cheer up the inside of an entrance hall closet with bright paint or wallpaper.
12. Plants add individually and color to a room. Use a plant to fill in that empty space where you intend to put a chair later.
13. Install a dimmer switch to control your lighting to suit the occasion.
14. To obtain a moonlight effect at night, use florescent tube lights over windows and behind your drapes.
15. For extra seating, add a couple of small foot stools or ottomans to your decor.
16. Display your children's water color and crayon pictures on the family room wall.
17. A wide shelf over the exposed bedroom radiator, and you have a dressing table.
18. Display your book collection with pride, they add color and character to any decor.
19. Pictures, and throw pillows in carefully chosen colors make great accessories.
20. An art form in themselves, area rugs are now being used as wall hangings.
21. Old wooden cooking utensils mounted on top of a breadboard make unusual wall sculptures for a kitchen wall.
22. Don't shy away from a fake fireplace, it can add architectural feeling to a room.
23. Jazz up your kitchen by applying washable wall covering to the front of your cabinets and fridge.
24. Make unusual shape place mats, with vinyl fabric by the yard.
25. If you can't afford expensive pictures or paintings for walls, frame attractive fabrics and wallpaper.

**More Pay For School Cleaners**

Halton County Board of Education has approved a settlement giving about 90 cleaning ladies, members of Local 1278, Canadian Union of Public Employees, a 30 cent per-hour raise over two years.

The 7.2 per cent per-year increase was settled after both the original negotiations and recent conciliation meetings had failed to bring agreement.

The two-year agreement retroactive to Feb. 23 gives the cleaning ladies a 15-cent per hour raise to \$2.10 this year, and a further 15 cents per-hour beginning next Feb. 23.
