Costs \$240,000 To Heat Schools

Halton County Board of Education will pay about \$240,000 this year to heat schools and administrative facilities across the county, about the same amount that was paid out last year.

Trustees have approved the lowest tenders at the board meeting Thursday, with Gulf Canada Ltd. getting the bulk of the business in the form of a contract for about 1,100,000 gallons of oil at a cost of \$160,600. BP Oil Ltd. was awarded the remaining two contracts at total cost of \$78,850.

Several members of the Georgetown Rug Hooking Guild travelled to Belleville on Saturday to attend the annual general meeting of the Ontario Hooking Craft Guild. Mrs. Shirley Lyons was elected as vice-president, and Mrs. Audrey Deere as councillor for West Central (Halton & Peel) area with Mrs. Mary Lou Justason who has recently moved away from Georgetown being elected as councillor for Dufferin and Simcoe County.

Following the business meeting, more than 350 people enjoyed lunch and then visited the workshop of their choice of which there were four... the sculpturing of mushrooms, the hooking of fruit, three shade swatch shading and casserole dyeing. There was a display of hooked rugs and wall hangings in the assembly room which was open for public viewing on the Sunday.

Members have been very busy hooking a mosaic patterned rug fashion-dyed in autumn colours for which a draw will be made at the Craft and Hobby Show to be held in Holy Cross Auditorium on Friday June 29. There will be more than 20 different crafts displayed and demonstrated. They include Mrs. N. Boothe with decoupage, which is the art of decorating with cut out paper pictures and prints; Mr. and Mrs. H. Woodcraft with ceramics; The Rock and Mineral Club of Brampton who will demonstrate the cutting of special types of rock; J. Forbes who will show his collection of welded steel sculptures and W. Knight who will have working models of steam engines on show.

The fine arts are represented by Miss D. Stone, A.O.C.A. painting landscapes and Mrs. E. Melton at work on a portrait. Two very old pioneer crafts will be shown by Mrs. V. Robinson who makes apple dolls and Mrs. R. Reesor who makes dolls from corn husks. Mrs. E. Lawrie will show her collection of dolls from all corners of the world dressed in national costume.

Flowers play a large part in the show. Mrs. D. Murphy will display plaques and paper weights using dried flowers while Mrs. B. Gardner shows how to copy nature making use of paper flowers. It is hoped that The Horticultural Society will add to the colour by making fresh flower arrangements.

Candle-making will be shown by Mrs. P. Clemons and all types of leather craft will be displayed by Mrs. A. Ford. The skill and imagination of the woodcarver will be demonstrated by N. Palmer and the unusual craft of moulding ordinary bread dough into three dimensional plaques will be shown by Mrs. G. Aubrey.

A display of world stamps including special Masonic issues will be presented by D. Webb and the modern treatment of an old craft, macrame, will be demonstrated by Mrs. A. Dean who will also be showing items of basket weaving.

Mrs. D. Goodwin will demonstrate technique for spinning and weaving and Mr. A. Ward will show how the very old


craft of symmography has been brought right up to date. The many varied designs and types of rug hooking adapted to both floor

rugs and wall hangings will be shown by members of the Guild and Mrs. J. Teller will be seen at work on her room sized rug.
