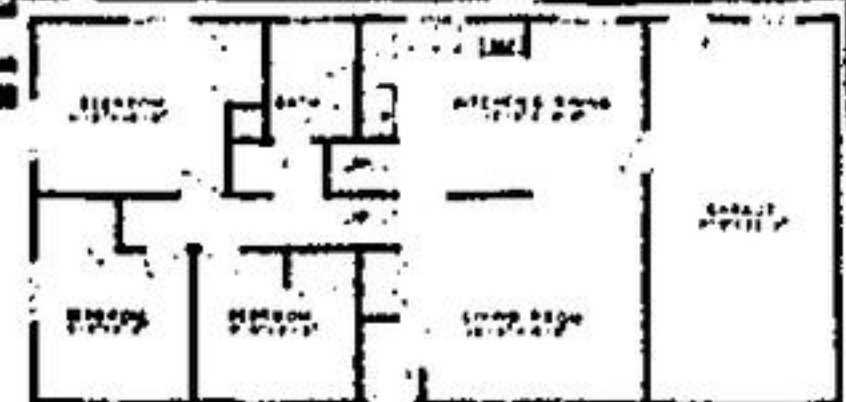

In Regional Setup

Georgetown Hydro Wouldn't Be Swallowed

Each municipality within a possible Halton regional government structure should have its own hydro-electric commission, say the existing commissions in Halton County. A study by the commissions says all commissions should be publicly-elected rather than appointed by councils.

The study, presented to county council's administration committee this week, says a single commission for an entire Halton region would be inefficient.

ELECTED MEMBERS
The commissions should have four elected members and the mayor, the study suggests.

Rural utilities, now operated by the Ontario Hydro Electric Commission, should be taken over by local commissions with the creation of regional government, the study urges. Payment for facilities should be amortized over 10-to-20 years.

LOT LINES
The study recommends that

new boundaries of municipalities be placed on the back of lot lines rather than on roads. This would prevent duplication of equipment on boundary roads.
