Approve Million Dollar Sewage Plant Addition

Number of Garages Frozen at Nineteen

A by-law to limit the number of service stations at the present number of 19 was passed at council Monday night. Cr. Ern Hyde stressed that the intent of the by-law was to control the site plan of such an establishment, not to restrict them. "It certainly is not to restrict the number to protect the existing 19", he commented. Cr. Phil Siddall said the by-law would control the location and distribution patterns. "Any application would be considered on its merit", he explained. The mayor said the intent was to protect locations. "It is industrial areas we're mainly concerned about", he added.

Car Bounced Into House

Tries to Leave, Meets Police After Crash

A driver whose car jumped a curb, crossed a lawn and bounced a car parked in a driveway into the corner of the neighbouring house, has been charged by Georgetown police. The parked 1967 Chevelle belonging to Claude Vaters of 202 Delrex Boulevard was wrecked when hit broadside as it sat in the Vaters' driveway at 1:15 Saturday morning and knocked up against the corner of the next house.

The home of Albert Griffiths, 200 Delrex Boulevard received about \$150 damage. The 1967 Ford which struck the parked car, its front end almost completely smashed, reversed onto the road and started to drive away down Delrex, but was stopped by police before getting far. Damage was in the neighbourhood of \$1,000 to each car. The only other reportable accident investigated by police this week happened Saturday on the Georgetown Market parking lot where a 1970 Acadia driven by Clarence Doyle of 21 Normandy Boulevard received \$400 damage when it struck a light standard. A passenger, eight year old Janet Doyle, suffered minor injury.

An extension to the sewage treatment plant, estimated at over one million dollars, was approved by council, Monday night, over the objections of Reeve Ric Morrow, and Crs. Phil Siddall and Donna Denison. The Ontario Water Resources Commission was requested to proceed immediately with the extension which would up the capacity to three million gallons a day, and to add effluent polishing facilities. The extension has been approved by the O.W.R.C.

Cr. Denison pointed out that no one had mentioned the price tag, which she said was over a million dollars. Cr. Phil Siddall said he could not vote for such an expenditure. "We know we must spend around \$300,000, but to pay for a million dollar project we should have a population of 30,000 people," he remarked. He pointed out that the planning board claimed a number of

recommendations to better the situation had not been adopted. He claimed water seepage and storm sewer accounted for a lot of the problem. "I won't go for this kind of money to serve the next 18,000 people who come here," he concluded.

FINED SOON

Cr. Joan Smith claimed the O.W.R.C. said the cost of correcting the seepage and storm sewer water would be as much as the extension. "The problem is no longer just storm sewer water it is too many solids being released into the river. Soon we would be fined for polluting," she contended. She reminded council that Glen Williams and Norval might be served under regional government.

Cr. Ern Hyde agreed that Glen Williams probably be serviced in the future, and claimed any smaller extension would be outdated before it was finished.

WASTING TIME

Deputy reeve Art Speight insisted the O.W.R.C. had stated the more expensive addition must be done. He said the cut off point had already been passed, and construction would take at least three years. "We are wasting time," he added. The mayor agreed the town couldn't get by on half measures. The vote showed only Reeve Morrow, and Cr. Denison and Siddall opposed. Cr. Ernie Sykes, sanitation chairman, was absent.

A 15 member delegation headed by spokesman Mrs. Jean Campbell, 60 Regan Crescent, complained to council Monday night of the neglect and unsightly mess of an area at Delrex and Regan Crescent "which is supposedly a green belt." Mrs. Campbell said the delegation was backed up by a petition signed by 50 ratepayers in the area. She termed the area an untidy wasteland of garbage and barren clay. "We sit in a dustbowl which covers laundry, grass and swimmingpools with a thick film of dust," she remarked. She claimed the dust was a hazard to allergy sufferers. She also told council many licensed motorcycles use the area "making the noise deafening."

H. Cornfoot, 171 Mountainview Road South, was appointed to the Recreation Committee, to replace J. D. McCulloch, who has been transferred out of town.

The clerk-administrator was authorized to hire two students for the summer for general office work.

Permission was granted to Golden Year Committee to hang banners at the east and west approaches to town, and at the Maple Avenue end, announcing the Golden Year Celebrations.

Councillors were reimbursed \$40 each for their day long attendance at the TECO conference in Milton, last Saturday.

A request from Mrs. W. Jacoletti to continue using the portion of her property, at 87 Main Street North, formerly used for gas pumps, for commercial purposes, was referred to committee.

Finance chairman Reeve Ric Morrow said the treasurer's report would be received in two weeks, and the town would know where they stand financially. He felt the chances were good since the town had received an extra road subsidy they did not know about. Cr. Ern Hyde urged an engineer's study of the cost be done first. He pointed out that the slopes were steep, and grading and filling might have to be done in order to maintain the area. The motion to have the area sodded was withdrawn and another asking the engineer to give costs and the work involved to the works committee, was substituted. All favoured the motion.

Senior Soccer Arrives Saturday

Georgetown soccer fans can watch some high calibre senior soccer this Saturday evening when the Georgetown Falcons, now of the Toronto District Soccer League, play their first home game at Cedarvale. S. A. The Falcons' lineup also includes 15 local players, two from Acton, two from the Brampton area, and one from Weston.

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Police Charge Five Youths With Break-Ins

Five local youth and four local juveniles have been charged on a number of counts following investigation by the Criminal Investigation Branch of the Georgetown Police Department. Seventeen charges have been laid against the youths in connection with break-and-entries at the Carretal Building, Mino Millwork, East End Car Wash, Delrex Restaurant, North Halton Ford, the Legion Branch 120, and a private home, and attempted break-in at the Legion. The juveniles are charged with break-and-entries into a number of east end homes. The break-ins cover a period dating back to 1970.

Would Be Temporary

Move to Limit Double Dwelling in R4 Zone

Until the comprehensive review of the official plan and zoning by-law is completed, estimated at June 1973, double dwellings, apartment house, and multiple attached dwellings, will no longer be permitted in an R4 zone. The by-law was given two readings Monday night, and the third held for a legal opinion. The by-law put a time limit of June 30, 1973 as the expiry date, but it could be repealed sooner. Cr. Ern Hyde asked how applications now being processed would be affected. He argued present applications should be exempted. Council agreed to hold the third reading till a legal opinion was obtained.
