

Cathy Lince, Colin Foster are Boy, Girl Athletes of the Year

Cathy Lince and Colin Foster were named outstanding boy and girl athletes of the year, at the second annual Georgetown District High School Athletic Banquet, Wednesday night.

Cathy Lince received the Mary Patterson award from Mrs. Patterson, who up till last year was head of the physical education department, and is now in guidance.

Colin Foster was presented with the Fokkens award by Clive Llewellyn, last year's winner. The McLaren Award, presented annually to the student who has contributed the most to the athletic program both as participant, and as a manager, was won by Rick (Huck) Quimbury. Lynn McLaren, for whom the award was named, made the presentation. He was head of the GDHS Physical Education Department for years before becoming the vice principal of M. M. Robinson School in Burlington.

The Paul Legge Award named after another ex-teacher at the high school went to Jim Gibson. This award goes to the boy or girl who holds a senior athletic award and achieves the highest academic standing. Car trouble on the way from London, where he now teaches, prevented Paul Legge from presenting his award. Principal Mike Furlong acted as stand-in.

NEW AWARD
A new award this year, the W. R. Bennett Award went to Jennifer Linton, as the outstanding gymnast of the year. This was presented by Mr. Bennett.

Thirty students received junior letters, and 15 senior letters, for "Outstanding contributions to

both the intra-mural and inter-scholastic programs." Team captains of 30 teams received crests to be distributed to the team members. The teams covered football, soccer, golf, skiing, swimming, wrestling, gymnastics, field hockey, cross country, dance club, badminton, track and field, basketball, and volleyball.

SELF-IMAGE
Guest speaker, F. DeArmon, an ex-basketball coach at Byerson, and now wrestling coach at University of Waterloo, urged the students to develop a good self image. He claimed a winning feeling in everything the person does is the key to success. He termed self image, "The biggest discovery in psychology, and the key to human personality and behavior."

He suggested that many people carry around a picture of themselves very different from that seen by others. "If you feel you are a failure type person, you will find ways to fail," he remarked. He concluded by reminding the group the self image can be changed to one more satisfying for the individual.

The speaker was thanked by Colin Foster, president of the Boys' Athletic Association, who acted as Master of Ceremonies.
