Halton NDP's Would Disband Waffle Group

Halton New Democrats voted 26-14 last week to endorse the party's provincial executive recommendation that the left-wing splinter group, the Waffle, disband its organization and cease all political activities.

"We've been patient. We've been more than patient. It's been costly," said long-time member Ivan Armstrong. "The time is now to ask them to disband in an honourable manner."

The Halton West NDP association voted 31-2 last week to ask the executive to find a place for the Waffle within the party structure.

The executive's recommendation comes up for action at the provincial council meeting June 24 and 25 in Orillia.

NO DEALS
Halton's federal candidate, Stephen Alesch, did not agree with his fellow NDP members and voted against the move. "If we can't work out a compromise, we will destroy the essence of the party," he said.

In an hour-long debate Halton's members wanted no deals. Ivan Armstrong declared he was opposed to "opportunists taking over our party". He said the Waffle was "usurping" the party with its independent moves.

He described the Waffle members as Johnnie-come-latelys who hadn't done an honest day's work in their lives. "There's no question of compromise in my mind", he said.

Mrs. Ruby Campbell said the NDP was formed to give labor a

voice but that the unions were rarely able to get workers' votes. She said there was a principle involved - that the party was a democracy.

In other business the Halton Association passed a motion reaffirming its opposition to separate school support beyond Grade 8 in Ontario.

Spruce Budworm In Halton

A small infestation of the spruce budworm is threatening spruce and balsam trees in the county. The Ontario agriculture and food department recommends keeping an eye on trees but does not advise preventative spraying.

Burke McNeill, nursery specialist at the department's Milton branch, said the budworm count on afflicted trees is generally low.

McNeill said, "Where the infestation is heavy, the trees should be sprayed with Malathion. However, where there are only a few, as is the case in the majority of trees inspected, simply pick the caterpillars off and destroy them."

The budworm is a black and orange caterpillar that grows to about one inch in length at maturity.
