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Museum Notes

Summer Festival Funds Will Build Stone Terrace

"The Friends of the Museum" will hold their third annual Summer Festival this weekend at the Halton County Museum, Kelsco Park, Milton. The festivities will take place from 2 to 6, Saturday and Sunday afternoons.

The museum buildings will be open for your visit. The huge old barn, built in the 1850's, houses the museum's collection of household furnishings - early Canadian and Victorian. The craft house has an excellent display of the pioneer woman's skill in needlecraft, weaving, crocheting, quilting etc., and a new exhibit of period clothes. The carriage house is filled with pioneer farm machinery, sleighs, and carriages.

Its gallery - with an antique toy collection, old school supplies, and extensive ornithological display - is a favourite with the many youngsters who visit the museum. The 1922 log cabin was re-erected on the museum grounds as the 1971 project of the Friends. Now nearing completion, the cabin is an excellent example of the county's very first homes.

An interesting outdoor musical programme has been planned for the week-end festival with performances by: folk and square dancers, accordianists, Oakville Citizens Band, and Holy Rosary Choir, Milton.

Of particular interest to Georgetown visitors will be performances by the G.D.H.S. folk singing club - mid-afternoon Saturday, and 4 p.m. Sunday; and the G.D.H.S. Band - 2 p.m. Sunday.

STONE-WORK TERRACE

Tea and cookies, pop and chips will be available: a "white elephant" table, and book booth; the Burlington Pottery Guild, and A.R.C. Industries, Hornby offer a variety of items for sale.

Raffle tickets will be sold on a quilt, Dresden plate pattern, and the second quilt made for the Friends by Mrs. Howard Bradley of Hornby. The draw will be made Sunday afternoon.

The proceeds from this year's Festival will be used to build an extensive stone-work terrace in front of the barn - the main museum building.

The Halton Region Conservation Authority charges a park admission fee of \$1.50 per car. So... fill your car with friends and relatives, toss in bathing suits and picnic lunches, and make a day of it!

OPP Staff Sergeant Promoted, Transferred

Amend Hospital Scheme

Want to See Statement Of Surplus Before Grant

Halton County has amended its hospital building grant scheme to take into account any surplus funds, such as bequests, the hospitals may have.

Last week the administration committee revised its grant scheme to require hospitals to produce statements of surplus funds before the county will pay the 33 percent share of construction.

NOTEARMARKED
The revised policy will, in the case of bequests and donations, apply only to monies which are not

specifically earmarked for a project.

Earlier this year the county agreed to pay one-third of hospital construction costs approved by the Ontario Hospital Services Commission. The province pays the other two thirds through OHSC.

RISING COSTS
The previous grant structure had allowed a grant of \$6,000 per bed. The hospitals said rising costs and new emphasis on out-patient treatment made the county grant valueless to the hospitals.

Treleaven Replaces Latimer as Crown

The Honourable Dalton Bales, Q.C., Attorney General, announces the appointment of James A. Treleaven, Assistant Crown Attorney for the County of Wentworth, at Hamilton. On March 27, 1972, he was transferred to the position of full-time Assistant Crown Attorney for the County of Halton. His new promotion to the position of Crown Attorney for this County took effect on June 1st, 1972.

Mr. Treleaven brings into his new position extensive experience in criminal law, first as part-time Assistant Crown Attorney between the years 1967 and 1971 and later as a full-time Assistant Crown Attorney for the Counties of Wentworth and Halton.

Mr. Treleaven was born in Hamilton, is 30 years of age and is married. He received his B.A. degree from McMaster University and graduated from Ospeode Hall Law School in 1965 and was called to the Bar of Ontario in 1967.

Halton County's first agricultural representative, Harry R. (Bunny) Hare, died in hospital in Oshawa late last month.

The 85-year-old Hare opened the first office of the Ontario agriculture department in Milton in 1914. In the fall of 1915 he enlisted in the Canadian forces and went overseas.

After the First World War Hare continued his education at the University of British Columbia and later worked for the Canada department of agriculture and federal labor department.

He also served as an agricultural adviser in Iraq for the United Nations and as a superintendent of farm development under the Veterans'
