

Honeymoon in New England Follows Street-Hulme Vows

A honeymoon trip in the Adirondacks, mainly in Vermont and New Hampshire motoring back up through Lake Placid district and the Thousand Islands followed the double ring ceremony during the nuptial mass in the Holy Cross Catholic Church on June 3 at 4:00 p.m. of Brenda Lynn Hulme and Roger Brian Street.

The bride, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Kenneth Hulme, 10 Gower Court, Georgetown, was given in marriage by her

father, Father O. deVent was the officiating clergyman and wedding music was played by organist J. Redmond during the ceremony.

The bride wore an A-line polyester peau de soie floor length wedding gown. The empire waist was trimmed with chintilly lace as well as the top of the six inch ruffle around the base of her gown. Flowers of chintilly lace also accented the sleeves and around the gown. The sleeves which were full then tapered, had a dainty

ruffle around the wrists to match the base of her gown. She wore a wedding ring headpiece with an attached arrangement of chintilly lace petals with matching lace on the flowing cathedral train. She carried a cascade bouquet of pink baby roses and lily of the valley with a sprig of heather from Scotland which the groom's mother had carried in her bouquet.

Their floppy brimmed hats with a floral pattern ruffled band and long streamers, and nosegay bouquets of sprayed mums with long streamers, were both colour matched to the ruffle at the bottom of their dresses. Each wore a sterling silver necklace with their birthstone and matching ring which was a gift from the bride.
