Points Out Sixth Line Danger Spots

Traffic hazards in the 6th Line area were drawn to the attention of Esquering council, Monday night, in a letter from Art McAllister, R.R.1 Limehouse.

Mr. McAllister contended the 6th Line north from the river should have "watch for children" signs, and speed limit signs. He pointed out, too, that the steep incline to a busy road, where the 6th Line, and 22 Sideroad meet is a dangerous slippery intersection in winter. He said the 7th Line and given road intersection was exactly the same, and suggested at least sandboxes be available in winter.

County Council Agrees Provincial Tax Assessment "Unfair" Says Ric Morrow

Georgetown Reeve Ric Morrow told county council last week the provincial assessment is unfair because it requires the 1973 tax levy to be based on 1970 and 1971 statistics.

Morrow told county council last week the provincial assessment is unfair because it requires the 1973 tax levy to be based on 1970 and 1971 statistics.

"The Act has us collecting money on the basis of how things were two years ago", he said.

"Milton has grown greatly in the last few years while other municipalities have not. It's unfair not to have everybody paying their proper share of the burden."

If the present legislation is adhered to, Milton would contribute 2.9 percent of the county revenue next year. Burlington would pay 43.8 percent, with Oakville chipping in 35.5 percent.

The balance would be split four ways: Georgetown, 6.9 percent; Esquering township, 3.9 percent; Acton 0.9 percent and Nassagaweya township, 1.8 percent.

INCREASED

While the difference might only be a fraction of one percent, by using current assessment figures, Milton's share might be increased and everyone else's reduced a bit, according to Mr. Morrow.

County council agreed with the Georgetown reeve and will ask Queen's Park for special privileges allowing it to postpone settling the 1973 tax rate until the 1972 assessment figures are available.

As it is now, the rate must be set by Oct. 1 although the assessment data won't be published until next March.
