



# Goose Hunting At James Bay

One of the best package deals of all (and this one is for the hunter) will see you safe at Cape Jones on the east coast of James Bay, Quebec, for a goose hunt you will never forget.

**LEAVES HAMILTON**  
The package deal is a \$325.00, one and that includes plane fare for an Austin Airways plane which leaves Hamilton at 7 a.m.

A short stop is made at Timmins to refuel and then on to arrive at Cape Jones in mid-afternoon where hunters will be welcomed by the camp manager and made comfortable.

The package deal also includes meals, good lodgings, safe canoes, good motors, expert Cree Indian guides and plane or canoe transportation to the surrounding camp of your choice.

**GOOD WALKING**  
Those who are short winded won't have to worry about walking very far, because hunting is done within a short distance from the camps and one doesn't have to slog through mud because it's mostly rock under foot.

**CANADA GEESE**  
The geese one will bag will be the much sought after Canada Goose.

One Cree Indian guide is provided for every two hunters. They make sure the shooting is done well away from the feeding grounds.

**CAMERAS**  
Cameras are a must or one is apt to kick himself all the way home. I would suggest an instamatic movie camera with at least 12 films of 50 feet each. (Remember you can't buy them up there.) I would also suggest another camera for taking stills, both in colour and black and white. I would suggest about 3 films of each. I myself went to James Bay to shoot geese a few years ago. I had a good shoot, but I ran out of film. I only took six movie films and I should have had a dozen.

One 50 foot film is soon used up if one shoots the proper amount of footage of each scene. I ended up with a fair film that I treasure very much as well as the stills I took. So... enough about cameras let's get back to James Bay Geese.

**CAMPS**  
Roggan River camp is a good one and is serviced from Cape Jones, Paul's Bay, and Dead Duck Bay are serviced from Fort George.

**MEALS**  
At Cape Jones the meals are made up by one expert white chef, plus several expert Cree Indian Chefs, who are well trained in the art. Meals consist of all the goodies that make up a good breakfast, plus geese, steaks, roasts, and other foods for suppers.

One American whom I met on the train coming home had this to say about the food where he



was hunting. "It was fabulous food. I never had anything better in the Waldorf Astoria Hotel in New York City." "I go back every year" he said.

Shells for shotguns are available at the camps for a reasonable price.

**PARK PERMITS**  
A park permit to shoot geese is one thing the hunter must pay for along with a migratory bird stamp which I believe is about \$2.00. The park permit is \$17.50. Goose hunting today is really within everyone's pocket book it's really a must for every wild fowler.

Possession limit is 10 geese in Quebec.

**THE SMILING CREE INDIAN**  
He has reason to smile he has 10 nice Canada Geese which is a days limit for his two hunters. (P.S. See picture)
