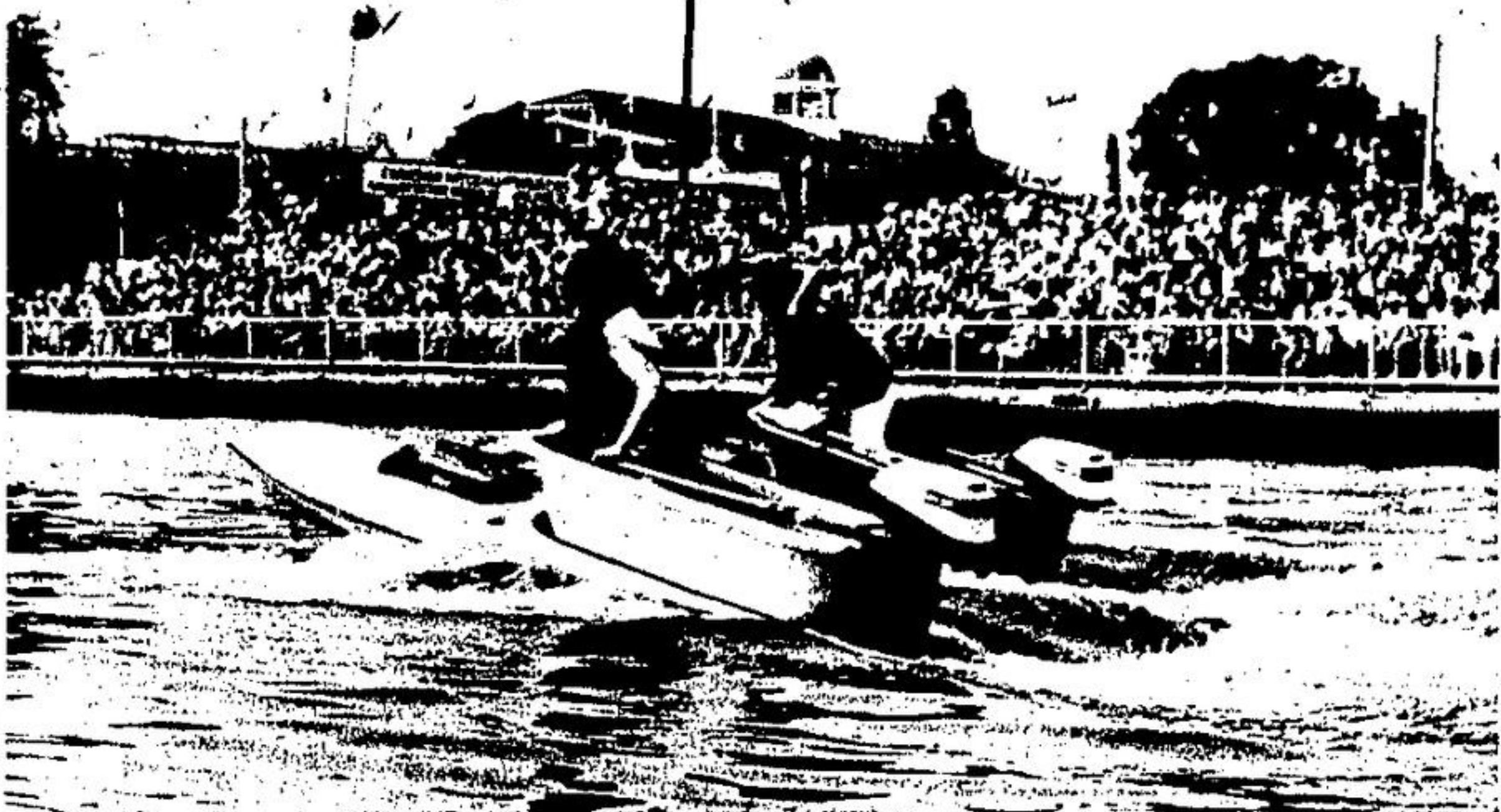

# Rattlesnake Park Opens New Area

Halton West MPP George Kerr of Burlington has announced a grant of \$103,605 to extend the present Rattlesnake Point Park on the Niagara Escarpment in Burlington by over one-third its present area.

The 112-acre tract will be added to the present 300 acres of developed parkland, which includes a scenic lookout, picnic facilities, and play and parking areas.

Rattlesnake Point Park is located on Guelph Line at No. 10 Sideroad.

The park is northeast of a tract purchased earlier this

year by the town and the Halton Region Conservation Authority. That 710-acre area is located at No. 2 Sideroad and Guelph Line.

The total cost of the new acquisition is \$138,140, with the seven municipalities of Halton County who make up the HRCOA sharing the difference between the purchase price and the provincial grant. Burlington will pay \$15,800 of the total cost.

A total of 2,217 acres of escarpment land have now been purchased by the HRCOA as part of its long-range plan to preserve the natural formation.

# Province Will Help Establish Separate School Film Library

The province will help Halton County Separate School Board establish its own film library, trustees were told at a board meeting last week.

The board is one of 53 receiving help from the ministry of education in attaining an optimum stock of one English language film per teacher, trustees learned.

The board has just been notified the province will supply it with 80 percent of this optimum on a long-term loan basis, which is us," said trustee Don Hill, practically giving them to chairman of the board's education committee.

130 FILMS

Superintendent of schools Clifford Byrnes said the board will be supplied with 130 films

from the ministry's present stock and will be allowed to select another 87 new films by March 1973.

The board will then have to purchase 55 more films to reach its ratio of one film for each of its 272 English language teachers.

The board is in the process of setting up its own film library and has budgeted for 50 films at a maximum cost of \$150 each for this year, Byrnes said.

PHASING-OUT

The ministry is phasing out its central film library by redistributing stock to school boards across Ontario on a long-term loan basis, he said.

Main aim of the program is ultimate sharing of film material among boards, he said.

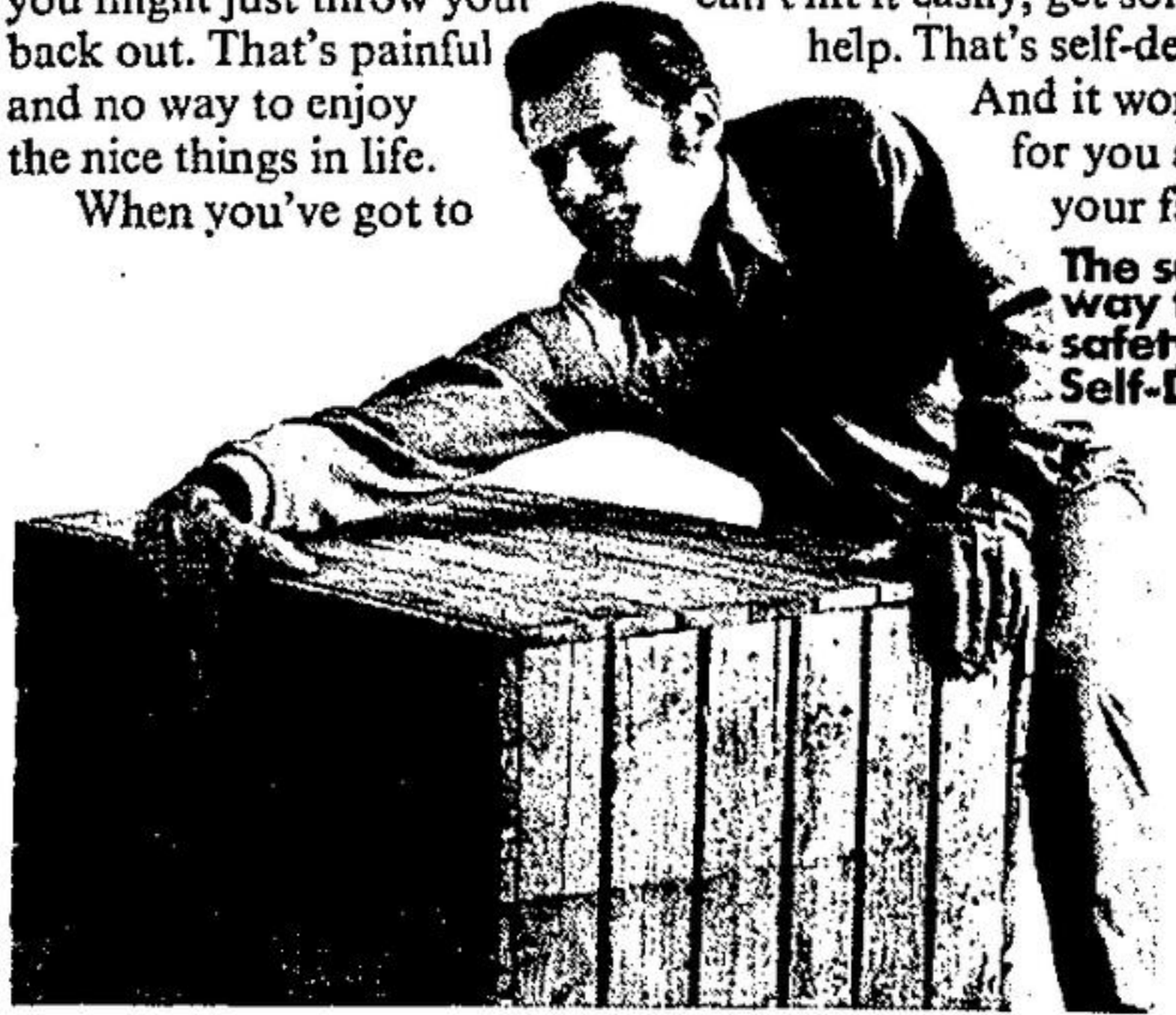
