Paintings lined snowflakes, sculpture, handicrafts and blown glass filled many booths around the park, with a great many Georgetown artists and craftsmen displaying their talents.

John Sommer, of Gallery House Sol, judged the exhibits, awarding first prize for paintings to Freda Nelson, of Rockwood, for a painting entitled "Romantic Landscape." Second prize went to R. W. Anderson of Bramalea, with "Digging a Well in Muskoka" and third prize to a Georgetown man Ted White, 8 Irwin Crescent for his painting "Canadian National."

In the crafts class, glassblower Clark Guettel of Caledon East was the winner, Fran Herman of Toronto, was second for her batiks, and Jean and Jack Denny of Acton, third for their hand woven ponchos.

With Salaried Director

Ask Council Aid in Continuing Coffee House

The present Log Cabin coffee house on Mill Street has to close at the end of August, due to the expiration of the Opportunities for Youth grant, and the moving of the building, Colin Hayward, a member of initiative '72 told council, last week, as he asked council's help in acquiring a new site, and financial aid to establish another such coffee house.

Hayward presented a brief to council outlining the various activities of the coffee house, only one of four aspects of initiative '72. The other three are a film committee, a creative workshop, and a theatre committee.

The brief stated the coffee house provided a place for local talent to be heard, a drop-in centre, with a suitable social atmosphere, cultural activities, and counselling service.

ADD MORE:
Other activities to be added in the fall, if a site can be found, are a folk guild, creative writing workshop, lunch room for students and merchants, homework and tutoring service, and day care centre if staffing is feasible.

The project would be managed by one full time director at a salary of \$100 a week, and six part time workers, at \$15 a week.

Hayward suggested the young people themselves, donating their labour, could build a geodesic dome with approximately 1,000 sq. ft. of space for \$4,000.

Cr. Ernie Sykes commended them for their willingness to build it themselves but asked if they would consider a rental basis.

Hayward said they would consider any site.

CRAMPED
Cr. Phil Siddall asked why they didn't apply to Cedarvale for space.

Hayward replied that the drop-in centre had been there and it was really a boiler room with very cramped, and not too pleasant surroundings.

"It would appear to be an advantage to have a less institutionalized atmosphere", he added.

Mayor Bill Smith told the delegation of Colin Hayward, Anne Pendergast, Karen Priskney and Franc Sturino they would discuss it in committee.
