Three Trains Daily

Georgetown's GO Transit Will Link with Subway

Target date for the first phase of GO-transit from Georgetown through Brampton, Bramalea, Malton, Weston and into Toronto, has been set at the middle of 1973, according to transit officials of the ministry of transportation and communications.

Roy McEwen, operations manager for GO-transit disclosed that the first phase would include the routing of three trains daily inbound and outbound. "The trains will be run during commuter periods," he said. "Our target date is 1973, barring unforeseen problems."

Mr. McEwen said his department is now going through the process of dealing with the various municipalities along the route as to station locations. "We don't like to work unilaterally. We wish to get the feeling of the municipalities on the most favored locations for their stations," he said. Mr. McEwen said his

department is also in the process of negotiating with the railway for additional trackage and with equipment suppliers for locomotives and passenger cars.
