

Admit Fifth Class

Three Area Girls at C.V. Nursing School

Three Georgetown area girls, Ursula Fiedler, Gail Jamieson and Denise Rawlinson were among the fifth class of nursing students admitted September 5 at the Credit Valley School of Nursing.

The 135 young women and seven men are primarily from local areas (Mississauga, Streetsville, Georgetown, Brampton, Milton, Oakville, Toronto, etc.) Also represented are Virginia, California, Hong Kong, the Philippines, British Columbia, Quebec and distant regions of Ontario.

The new class will commence a two-year programme of study and experience and, upon completion, will be eligible to write the nurse registration examinations set by the College of Nurses of Ontario, to become an Ontario Registered Nurse. Credit Valley School of Nursing is one of over 60 schools of nursing in Ontario,

approved by law under the College of Nurses of Ontario. It is the only School of Nursing in Peel County, and is located at 2180 Hurontario Street in Mississauga.

OPENED IN '68
The School opened in 1968, to meet the needs of the community:

(a) by providing a school for students interested in nursing, and, though graduates from this School have obtained positions throughout Canada, the U.S. and Europe, some do reside locally, and

(b) provide graduates for the local hospitals, and

(c) thereby, provide care for patients within this community.

The five area hospitals in which the students receive clinical experience are: The Mississauga Hospital, The Oakville-Trafalgar Memorial Hospital, Peel Memorial Hospital, Milton

District Hospital, and Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital.

DIRECTOR
Miss Gressa Hubbert is the administrator of Credit Valley School of Nursing, and has the title of "director". The faculty of Credit Valley is composed of university-prepared nurse-teachers for both clinical and class areas, the administrative staff, health counsellor and librarian.

Social science courses are purchased for Credit Valley School of Nursing from Sheridan College of Applied Arts and Technology.

They got good hurling from John Holtby, especially in their 4-1 opening win when he gave up just four hits.

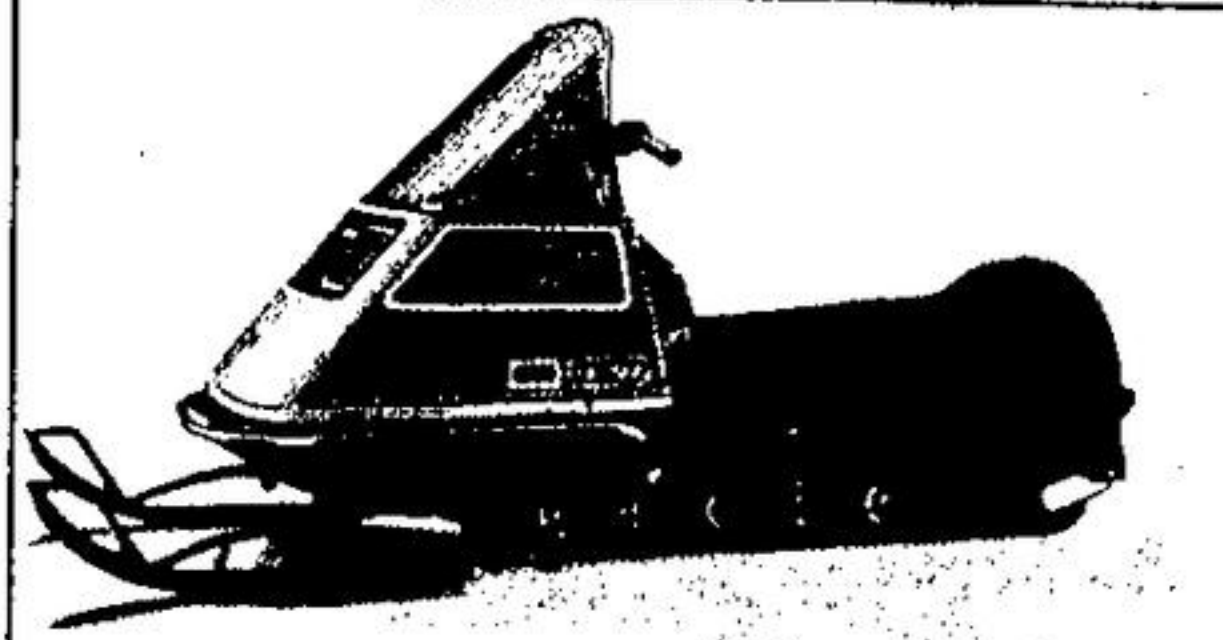
OUTHIT
