

# Credit River Pollution Increasing Report Says

**Mrs. J. Demchuk, 54, Hospital Employee**

Employed at Georgetown & District Memorial Hospital as a member of the kitchen staff, Mrs. John Demchuk, 17 Main Street South, died in hospital October 2.

Mr. and Mrs. Demchuk have been town residents since moving here from Windsor in 1962.

Born 54 years ago in Conquest, Saskatchewan, she was the former Nettie Mary Huculak, daughter of Mike and Mary Schaban Huculak. She moved to Windsor in 1930, where she married Ulysses Souliere.

Her husband and second child, Wallace, died in the 1946 tornado which levelled their home. The family was leaving the area in a truck, which was caught by the tornado, killing her husband and child, and hospitalizing the rest of the family.

She married Mr. Demchuk in 1951.

Mrs. Demchuk was a supervisor at the Greenfield Restaurant in Detroit, and after

moving here, was a kitchen employee at Peel Memorial Hospital, Brampton, until 1967, when she took a position in the local hospital.

Fond of bingo, she never realized her ambition to click in the big money.

She leaves her husband, sons Tom of Windsor and Ulysses of Owen Sound, and a daughter, Mary. Mrs. Wayne Norton, Glen Williams; 7 grandchildren, Dwayne, David, Darrell, Zina, Wally, Norman and Lynn; and sisters, Mrs. Art Youngson (Sophie), Mrs. Earl Stevens (Kay) and Mrs. Roy Carriere (Sophie) of Windsor and Mrs. S. Lloyd (Anne) of Merlin.

Requiem mass in Holy Cross Church was conducted October 4 by Father Otger Devent, with interment in Greenwood Cemetery. Pallbearers were Pete Laliberta, Art Youngson and Tim Carriere, Windsor; Joe Kondrachuk, Oil Springs; Chuck Kondrachuk, Port Hope; and Earl Legault, Brampton.

The quality of the water in the Credit River has been going steadily downhill for the past two years, according to a report presented to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority last Wednesday night.

The report from the ministry of the environment states that the bacteriological quality of the downstream portion of the Credit River (at Highways 2, 5 and 7) has deteriorated.

Member for Mississauga, Grant Clarkson, told the authority some attempt must be made to find the source of the pollution.

**MORE TESTS**

A resolution was presented calling for additional water-testing points to be set up on the river to supplement the six existing stations.

"I don't think we can sit idly back. We must take positive action as a conservation authority," said Mr. Clarkson.

"The ministry's proposal to sit back and watch isn't good enough."

He said Mississauga rescinded its bylaw prohibiting swimming in the Credit River this year, based on a report from the medical officer of health. "Now I begin to wonder," said Mr. Clarkson, "I come here and find the pollution count is up."

**COLIFORM COUNT**

The report from the ministry received by the authority in September is based on the coliform count in the Credit's waters. Coliform bacteria are bred in the intestines of warm-blooded animals and are usually an indication of fecal pollution. The coliform bacteria can come from man or livestock.

Other testing points along the river show like increases with some indicating dramatic rises. The testing point at the Credit and Highway 2 went from 949 in 1971 to 2,601 in 1972 and the Credit at Highway 5 indicated almost the same increase. The count at Silver Creek at Highway 7 station went from 148 in 1971 to 3,391 in 1972.

Mr. Clarkson said naming exactly a danger point figure for coliform count is a difficult thing, but added, "When the count reaches over 2,000 alarm bells begin ringing."

The ministry report had "no ready explanation for the increases this year," but cited some difficulties at the Georgetown sewage treatment plant as a possible contribution. It said better facilities are needed in Georgetown.

**BLAME DOUBTFUL**

The report stated, however, that "we would hesitate to suggest that this one sewage treatment plant would have such a profound effect on a river the size of the Credit."

Water quality improves the further upstream testing is carried out.

The conservation authority will set up an additional five testing points along the river in an effort to isolate sources of the pollution.

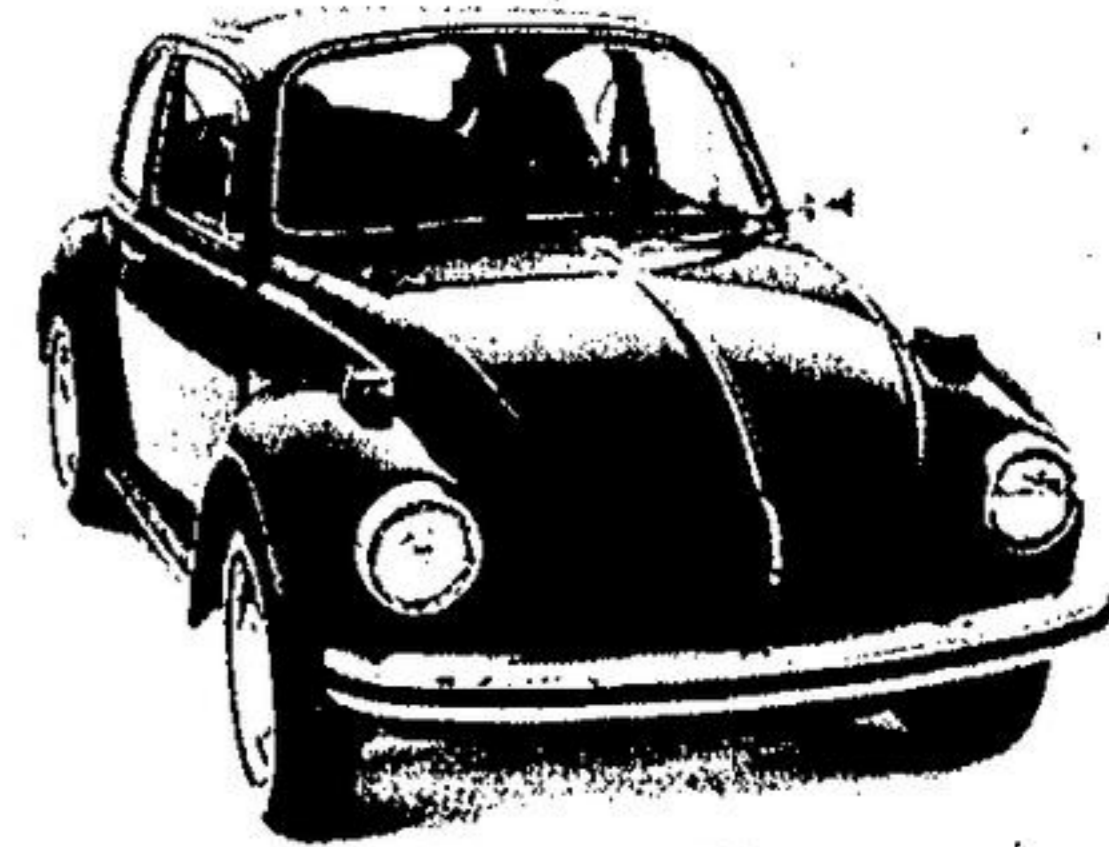
