

# Wet Roads Lead to Rash Of Week-end Accidents

A stolen car failed to make a curve on Emery Street, October 12, shot across the road and was stopped by the planter in front of 9 Emery Street, the home of Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Ritchie. The lawn at both the Ritchie house and No. 11 next door were torn up.

The car had been reported stolen by Claude Savole, 44 King Street. The '69 Fairlane received \$100 damage to the front bumper and splash panel.

The driver of the car escaped before police arrived on the scene.
