## Council Opposes Rezoning Request

Town council last week endorsed a Planning Board decision to veto a request for rezoning of a highway location.

Knolcrest Properties Ltd. has asked that the present M1 zoning for industry, be changed to C1 commercial. The area in question includes part of the Eagle Signal property on the highway.

The Planning Board told council that the building space exceeds the floor area for neighbourhood shopping and that the area does not conform with the town's proposed zoning by-law.

Ern Hyde opposed council's action.

He said the matter should have further study, like many similar requests in the past.

Mr. Joan Smith said Harold Fohert of the Knolcrest firm had not revealed results of a survey conducted in the area, to see if residents would approve a change.

Mr. Hyde argued that in the town's new official plan, part of the area will be commercial. But other councillors disagreed, and maintained the commercial area would end on the far side of the highway.



### NORTH HALTON REPORT

During the week of October 15-21, 1972 officers from North Halton Detachment of the Ontario Provincial Police worked a total of 1,023 hours and travelled 7,557 miles while patrolling area roads under their jurisdiction. One hundred drivers were summoned to appear in Provincial Court in Milton for various traffic violations and an additional 36 drivers received warnings. Proceedings in Provincial Court at Milton resulted in 183 convictions being registered.

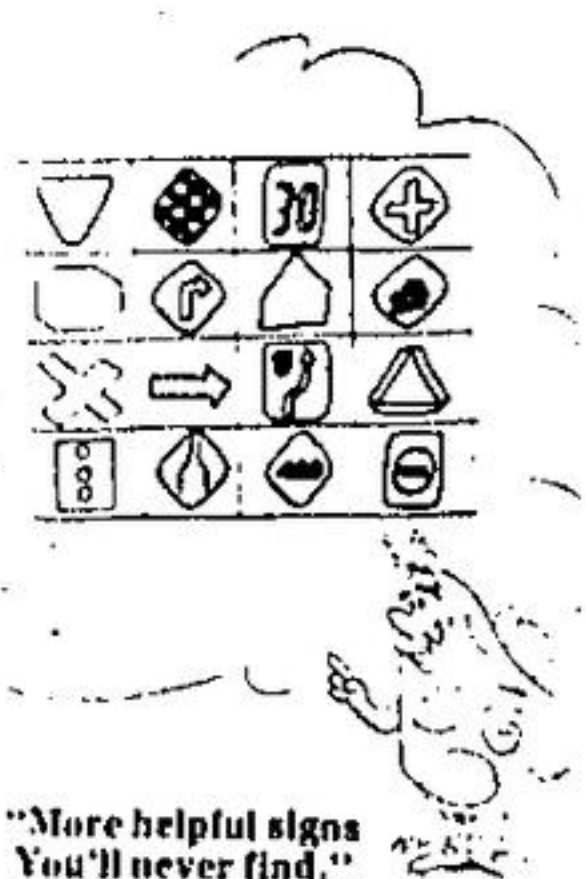
Officers were called upon to investigate 64 general occurrences. Included in this number were: 1 break and enter, 2 persons charged for violating the Liquor Control Act, 2 domestic disputes, 1 vehicle stolen and later recovered, 2 damage to property complaints, 1 trespassing complaint and 3 persons who had been reported missing earlier were located. The remaining occurrences were minor in nature and required little time to clear.

Investigation is continuing into the discovery of the remains of a human body found north of Georgetown on September 20, 1972.

Eleven collisions involving 17 vehicles occurred during this

reporting period. Property damage was estimated to total \$14,600.00. Four of these collisions resulted in injury to 11 persons while the 7 remaining collisions caused damage only to property. The number of drivers aged 25 and younger numbered 8 as did the number of drivers over 25 years. Eleven drivers involved in these collisions have been summoned to appear in Provincial Court at Milton.

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
