No Thought Of Cancelling Municipal Vote

Municipal elections will go ahead, as scheduled, despite rumours to the contrary that have been circulating in three southern Ontario counties, A. K. Meen, Parliamentary Assistant to the Ontario Treasurer Charles S. MacNaughton, said in a statement issued at Queen's Park this week.

Mr. Meen said the erroneous rumours arose apparently because a proposal is now in preparation for re-organization of local government in the counties of Peel, Halton and Wentworth (including the City of Hamilton).

Some citizens apparently have the erroneous notion that the re-organization of local government will make the December 4 elections unnecessary, and that existing councils' present terms of office will simply be extended, Mr. Meen said.

His statement in full said: "It has come to my attention that there is confusion in some people's minds about two important aspects of the local government reform program.

First of all the Government of Ontario is preparing a detailed proposal for local government re-organization in the area west of Metro for release late this fall. There is still a good deal of work ahead of us, and many

important briefs from municipal and other interested parties to be analyzed and considered. No conclusions about the details of those arrangements have been reached yet by the Government.

"Changes in local government in the counties of Peel, Halton and Wentworth (including Hamilton) are going to be made in the future but with no fixed timetable at this stage. I must state most emphatically that there will be no change in election arrangements for those municipalities whose council terms conclude in 1972. Should provincial

legislation be established next year to re-organize local government in the areas west of Metro, suitable provisions will be made at that time to have special elections held to establish local and regional municipal councils.
