\$300 Fire Damage To Hospital Boiler Room
Children playing with matches in a basement bedroom was the cause of a small fire in a mattress at 80 Haylawn Crescent according to Fire Chief Ben Buikema.
Firemen were called at 6:30 p.m. October 25, and quickly extinguished the blaze.
An hour later firemen were called to 80 Greystone Crescent where a filter on the furnace had become tangled in the fan. There was no fire.
A small fire at the hospital at 2:30 in the morning October 28 caused concern but only \$300 damage. Insulation around a pipe in the hallway by the boiler room was smoldering. Welders had been installing a new pipe, and it is thought a spark got into the insulation unnoticed.
