Farmhouse Raid Drug Charges Laid

Eleven Chinguacousy and Brampton residents were arrested Friday night after Chinguacousy police raided a farmhouse in Huttonville and netted \$625 worth of narcotics.

The farmhouse is situated on Lot 1, Concession 2, in Huttonville. The raid was carried out by five officers of the Criminal Investigation Bureau using a dog belonging to one of the officers.

Besides finding 25 bags, each containing what was said to be \$25 worth of marijuana, the officers also found small quantities of what they said was hashish and LSD.

One of those arrested, was charged with cultivating and growing marijuana. Others charged with possession with the purpose of trafficking and possession of an offensive weapon.

Police seized "chain belts" similar to motorcycle drive chains.

The raid was conducted at 6:30 p.m. Friday. Except for four of the accused the rest were released by a Justice of Peace on a personal undertaking.
