Some of the guests enjoyed an early afternoon cup of tea and cookies, and an opportunity to chat with friends. Others had a

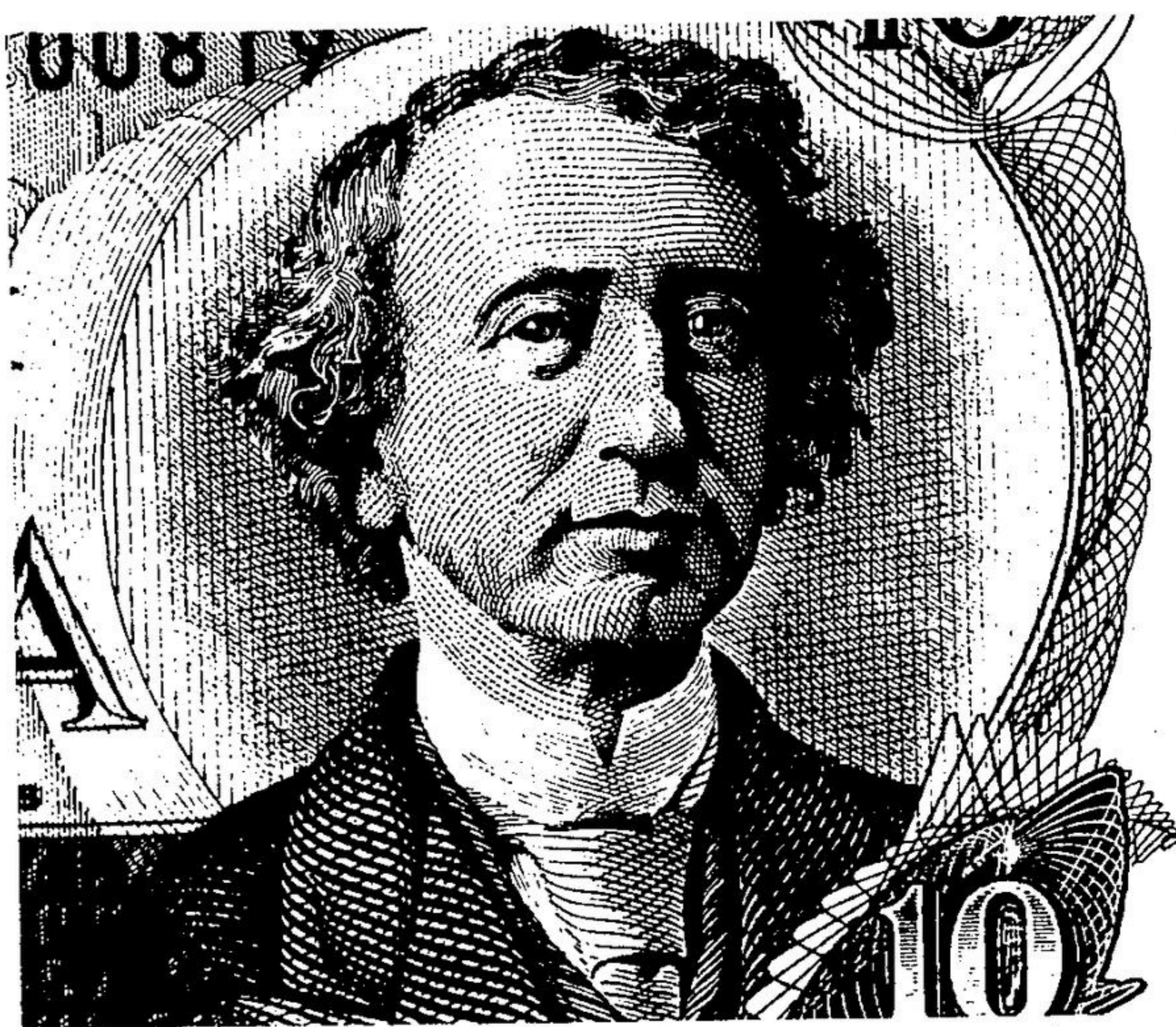
salad plate supper, and most of these visited the gypsy fortune teller.
