

Georgetown Air Cadets Named Ontario's Most Progressive

 Sunday, November 5 was a cold day, with overcast skies which seemed to threaten rain or light snow. The sunny periods promised by the various weather men, were few and far between, if any. However all this did not deter the many civic-minded citizens of Georgetown who found time to participate in the town's

once-a-year Remembrance Service at the town's cenotaph. The parade, which assembled at Branch 120 at 2 p.m., and moved off at approximately 2.15 p.m. headed by Legion officers, and town and district dignitaries, was not the biggest parade on record. In 1968-69, this same squadron won the trophy for the Best First Year Cadets in Ontario.

Set Higher Levies for New Construction

A by-law, setting higher levies per lot for new buildings was passed by council Monday. Cr. Phil Siddall estimated that the town treasury could benefit by thousands of dollars next year with the new by-law in force.

"That's the kind of financing the town should have been in years ago," he remarked. Cr. Ernie Hyde, who voted against the by-law, had an opposite opinion. "This penalizes building in the older part of town particularly," he said. "And it creates a hardship ultimately on the home buyer, rather than the developer."

He asked if the new levies are being collected on construction by firms in the Delrex area of town, or whether building there is being done on agreements made previous to the new legislation. "Since the by-law was first introduced, the town has collected \$21,000," said Cr. Siddall. The new by-law carried on an 8-1 vote.
