OFPLAYERS The purpose of grading players is to enable a selection committee to assemble house league teams of near equal strength. This will ensure that no team is so loaded with talent that other teams have little chance of offering serious competition.

Each player will be graded on such tiems as kicking - running · heading - throwing in knowledge of the rules and

REAL PROPERTY A second phase of the grading process relates to such items as attendance - willingness to urrept instructions and team

iteralling from these grading processes each player will be rated A. B. C. or D and house eague teams assembled in such a manner that each team will have as near as possible an equal mixture of A through D tand piavers




